## FROM THE PASTOR...

I don't know about you, but in my more reflective moments I sometimes wonder why anyone would want to become part of the Catholic Church, particularly given the grave scandals that the Church has been responsible for in recent years.

And yet, people do want to join themselves to the Body of Christ that is the Church!

This has been made abundantly evident to me in recent weeks by the sheer number of people who have made contact with the Diocesan RCIA contact person or myself, seeking to know more about how they can become one with us.

Some of those people will walk that journey with us as a Parish over the coming weeks and months, and this is something that is truly worthy of being celebrated and acknowledged.

Most importantly, I think, is that we celebrate the way in which God has moved in these people's lives, and acknowledge that in seeking us out, these people have already begun to respond to God's action in their lives.

The task of making them feel welcome among us, and helping them to explore how God continues to work in their lives, is a task that belongs to all of us. The *Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults* makes it clear (see *RCIA*, no. 9) that it is the entire People of God that have a primary responsibility for assisting those who are searching for Christ. Only after mentioning this responsibility does the *RCIA* go on to outline the responsibilities of others in the process of initiation or welcome.

So there we have it, a responsibility that belongs—first and foremost—to all of us because we are the People of God, called to spread the Good News of Jesus Christ, and to welcome those who might approach us seeking to know Jesus Christ better.

The challenge is to welcome these seekers and assist them on their journey, yet it is a challenge that can very easily be failed by the simplest of actions. And when we fail, we fail not only the seeker themselves but also the entire Body of Christ that is the Church.

Let's commit ourselves, right here and right now, to being a people and a place where seekers find welcome and assistance, a place where they can experience God's continuing action in their lives.

## NEWS FROM FR JOHN

Fr John has, unfortunately, suffered a small fall during his holidays in India, which has left him with a knee requiring some further rest. This means Fr John’s return will now be delayed until approximately the middle of November.

Fr John’s delayed return shouldn’t cause any great disruption to our ‘normal services’, but there may need to be some slight changes occasionally until the end of October. I would ask parishioners to pay particular attention to any changes in our usual pattern of liturgies that will be advertised in the Parish Bulletin.

## THE SUPERCARS ARE COMING!!

Parishioners will be well aware that the weekend of 25th and 26th November will see some disruption visiting our city, and therefore our parish, because of the running of a Supercars Race around the Newcastle foreshore.

Road closures at the eastern end of Newcastle will mean that St Mary’s will not be available that weekend for weddings, Mass or baptisms. To that end, and so that an early Sunday morning Mass is still available in the parish, the usual 7.30am Mass on Sunday 26th November will be transferred to the Cathedral for that weekend only.

Our Anglican brothers and sisters from Christchurch Cathedral are similarly impacted—and will be unable to celebrate their patronal feast in their church. After consulting with Bishop Bill, I have invited the Anglican Cathedral community to make use of the Cathedral on the evening of Sunday 26th November to celebrate Choral Evensong to mark their feast day. This will take place at 5pm in the Cathedral.

Our usual 5pm Mass on Sunday 26th November will be cancelled for that weekend only in order that we might offer ecumenical hospitality to our Anglican brothers and sisters. All are welcome to attend the celebration of Choral Evensong.

A significant amount of time during this meeting was taken up with 'administrative matters' including the election of officers and the setting of meeting dates for 2018.

The remainder of the meeting saw the Council begin to discuss the two primary areas of responsibility, i.e. Pastoral Planning, and the Promotion of Child Safe Standards.

In relation to Pastoral Planning, a task group of Council members has been established to look at an appropriate process of engaging with all the relevant stakeholders that is necessary for the development of a Parish Pastoral Plan. This process of engagement is necessary in order that the right kind of information is available to facilitate the next step in that ongoing process.

In relation to the issue of Child Protection, the Council will be seeking additional information from relevant diocesan agencies to assist them in this aspect of their work.

Matters that parishioners would like to put before the Pastoral Council in these areas can be submitted in writing via the Parish Office, addressed to either the Chairperson or the Parish Priest.

The work of the Pastoral Council is a complex one, and like all such tasks requires time to bring to fruition. The Council looks forward to serving the needs of the Parish and broader community over the coming three years.

## HOMILY FROM FR RICHARD LEONARD SJ

There are people inside and outside the Church who think that Christ did not give the Church a mandate to speak about political matters. They regularly quote the Gospel we have just heard to support their case. But if one knows and understands the context and meaning within which this text was written it provides no ammunition for those who want the Church to stay indoors, reflect on things 'spiritual', preach the eternal verities, and sing hymns more ancient than modern.

In Jesus' day, we know that some people thought he was a Zealot. Zealots were a well-organised group who agitated for the end of the Roman occupation of Israel. One of the things Zealots did was withhold paying the Roman taxes. We can see why some people thought Jesus may have been a Zealot. He took the part of the poor, the sick, women and those who lived on the fringes of society. He attacked the religious authorities of his day and certainly stirred up trouble in many places he went. On the other hand he rejected violence, taught his followers to pray for their enemies and to return good for evil. Jesus showed us that the justice and equality God longs to see in the world comes from a community which is converted by love, not by weapons, fear or revenge. Jesus was no Zealot.

Rather than undermine civil authority, however, Jesus, in this passage, supports it. But he does more. 'Give to Caesar what is Caesar's' is followed by 'And give to God, what is God's', which encompasses all the Caesars of this world, all civil authorities and states. The sense that we as the People of God can split off our obligations to the Gospel from the State is as false as it's dangerous.

We only have to think of some of the darkest chapters last century to see what happens when good, church-going people, like us, do not put their Sunday devotion in touch with their Monday politics. Evil can reign.

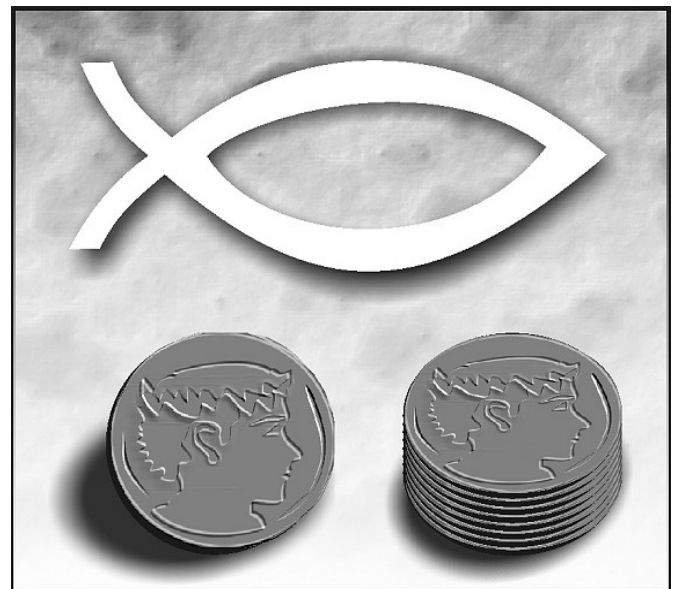
Christian leaders, who are charged to proclaim and defend the Gospel, are obliged to use whatever forum necessary to declare that God's personal love encompasses everyone and everything under heaven. As the prophet Isaiah reminds us today, God calls each one of us by name.

At times we may not agree with our religious leaders; we may think them ill informed; we may even think they have overstepped the mark. If this is the case we should tell them, enable them to consider other perspectives and to broaden the basis upon which they make their judgments. But we should never be seduced by those who want the Church sidelined from

the mainstream of the debates that shape the way we live, the values we share, the laws we draft and the priorities we draw up for our human community.

If the Church shows disinterest in any of this, it is untrue to the very things for which Jesus lived, died and was raised from the dead. By all means we should give to Caesar all that Caesar is justly entitled to have for the sake of the common good. A higher allegiance, however, goes to God, who will call all Caesars to account for what they have done and what they failed to do. And we might be asked to explain how we let them get away with it in the first place.

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### *Reflection by Artist*

In the parables of the last few weeks Jesus has been critical of the established order, but the establishment tries to get its own back in this week's gospel: some Pharisees try to entrap Jesus in dangerous word play about money and power. Jesus turns the tables on them by taking the argument from the hypothetical to the practical. He uses a real coin to make a concrete and sensible point about relative values. He is both wise and street-smart in his rebuttal, which serves to unmask the hypocrisy of a corrupt hierarchy.

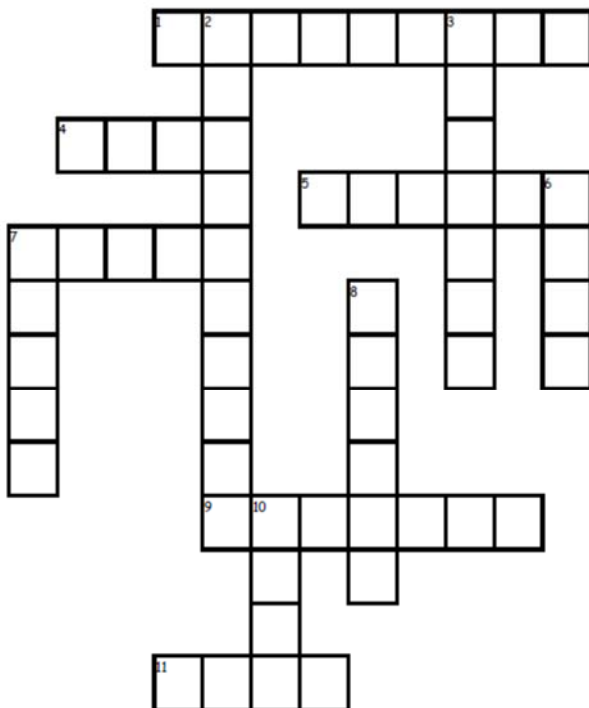

## HISTORICAL CONTEXT

### What's in a face?

*The question of coinage was a problematic one for first century Jews. The tradition – grounded in the commandments given to Moses on Mt Sinai – forbade the use of 'graven' or carved images. The people of Israel took this prohibition very seriously and did not portray the human face in artwork of any kind. Roman coins were minted with the face of the emperor on them and it was compulsory that taxes be paid with Roman coin. This helps to explain the role of the Temple money-changers who converted the Roman coin into Temple coin that could be used for religious purposes.*

## 500 YEARS AFTER THE REFORMATION.

This year marks the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation. In acknowledgement of this anniversary, Dr John D'Arcy May, FTCD emer, will present a seminar to enable us to explore its ongoing influence and invitation on **Thursday 16th November**, 3.30pm for **4pm** start, concluding at 7pm, in the Victor Peters Suite, 841 Hunter St, Newcastle West.

In this seminar, Dr John provides a framework for making sense of what we are already doing, examining factors which have influenced the progress or lack of it of the ecumenical movement.
