COVID-19 AND THE EASING OF Restrictions

Step Two in the easing of COVID-19 related restrictions has taken effect from 1 June 2020, with the making of a new public health order, *Public Health (COVID-19 Restrictions on Gathering and Movement) Order (No 3) 2020* ('the Order'). The Order allows ten (10) persons to participate in a gathering in a public place (which includes all our church buildings).

There are some exceptions to the general 10 person limit, including the following:

- Gatherings for the purpose of work. This may provide for a slow return to meetings of our councils and committees, though this must be done with caution and with attention to the principles of good hygiene and physical distancing.
- Wedding services. Up to 20 wedding guests are allowed, in addition to the persons being married, the celebrant, other persons necessary for the conduct of the service and one photographer, one videographer, or both.
- Funerals or memorial services held indoors can have up to 50 persons present. This limit excludes the persons necessary for the conduct of the service, such as the celebrant and the funeral directors.
- Other religious services allow up to 50 persons present, in addition to the persons necessary for the conduct of the service, such as the celebrant. This means it is possible for Baptisms to take place in our churches, though Bishop Bill has left this to the discretion of the minister, in consultation with the family.

Places of worship must not be open to members of the public, except for the purposes of conducting weddings, funeral/memorial services or religious services (as indicated above), or for private prayer.

The limit on the number of people who can be in the church for private prayer will be different for each church building and is dependent on the space available. The number permitted will be **the lesser** of

- 50 persons, or
- The total number of persons calculated by allowing 4 square metres of space for each person in the building.

The details (name, telephone number, and/or email) of any person participating in a wedding, funeral/ memorial service or religious service (or a gathering immediately following these events) must be provided to the Parish Priest or delegate, who must record and keep the details for a period of four weeks. This is a mandatory requirement of the Order and it must be observed. The reason for a person being in a church building will not be recorded. The Order no longer requires the collection of contact details of those attending the church building for the purposes of private prayer.

While the above provisions allow more than 10 persons present in total, a person cannot be in a church building as part of a group of more than 10 persons (for example, a group of family members).

The category of 'General Religious Services' includes the public celebration of Mass. Bishop Bill has determined that the public celebration of Masses within the Diocese may recommence, subject to parishes taking all reasonable precautions in relation to hygiene and physical distancing. Please see the separate notice on page 4 of this bulletin, regarding the resumption of Masses and the need to register your wish to attend.

Because of the limit on the number of people who may be able to attend any particular Mass, all members of the Church of the Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle, except priests, continue to be dispensed from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass.

Private worship will be available at the Sacred Heart Cathedral on Wednesdays and Thursdays, from 9am to 12 noon, though not this Wednesday, 17th June due to a funeral service. Confessions will be available from 10.30am on Saturdays. The Cathedral will not otherwise be available for private prayer.

Opportunities for private prayer will also generally be available at St Joseph's, The Junction, on each weekday from 10am to 12 noon, but please call the Regional Office beforehand to confirm (ph 4979 1101).

Important Information regarding the Resumption of Masses

With the easing of COVID-19 related restrictions that took effect from 1 June 2020, it is now possible to resume the celebration of public Masses, subject to certain requirements.

For the Sacred Heart Cathedral, the celebration of Mass, both weekdays and weekends, has recommenced with effect from Tuesday 9 June 2020, subject to the requirements set out on the Cathedral website, www.sacredhearthamilton.org.au

Under the current regulations, the upper limit of attendance at Mass is **50 people** (excluding the celebrant and the people necessary for the conduct of the service). For weekday Masses this number should be easily accommodated, but Sunday Masses regularly attract more than the prescribed limit of 50 people. So that everyone who may wish to attend has an equal and equitable opportunity to attend, **registration in advance will be required.**

Registration to attend Sunday Mass in the Cathedral will open at 9am on the Monday beforehand, and close promptly at midday on the Friday immediately before the Sunday. Registration is valid only for one week; you must register separately for each subsequent Sunday.

To register your wish to attend one of the Sunday Masses in the Cathedral, you must do so by visiting the website, www.sacredhearthamilton.org.au, and clicking on the registration button on the right hand column. If you do not have the ability to register via the website, please contact the Regional Office on 49791101, or email newcparish@mn.catholic.org.au where staff will be able to do so on your behalf.

If the number wishing to attend is above the limit of 50 persons, a 'lottery' will determine those who will be able to attend Mass on that weekend. Those selected to attend will be contacted on Friday afternoon/evening. Only those whose names have been selected will be permitted entry to the Cathedral for each Mass. There will no exception to this requirement. You will be required to provide your telephone number and/or email address as part of the registration process. This is a requirement of the current Public Health Order, and there can be no exception made. When attending Mass, please have your name 'ticked off' the list that is being monitored by a volunteer. For Sunday Masses at St Joseph's, The Junction and St Mary's, Newcastle, a similar registration process will apply. We thank you for your understanding during these difficult times and appreciate your continuing patience and support in relation to the registration requirements.

AN UPDATE REGARDING PLANNED GIVING

It has recently come to my attention that the usual procedure of offering a reduction letter for the School Building Levy, known as the DFSBL, is no longer able to be offered by the Parish. This is due to legislative changes related to Section 83C of the Education Act.

We are still able to offer a Tax Receipt to our planned givers.

Parishioners who require a tax receipt for planned giving for the 2019/20 financial year must notify the Parish Office. Please notify by one of the following methods:

Use the wording, "Please provide me with a Planned Giving tax receipt" and include your name and envelope number.

Phone: Call the Parish Office on 4979 1101.

Tax receipt data will be processed on 30 June 2020. No subsequent amendments are possible. Any requests received after 30 June 2020 will result in parishioners not receiving the requested tax deduction. If you do not require a tax receipt for tax purposes, it is preferable to refrain from requesting one, as this will enhance the tax deductibility for those who do use the tax receipt. I am happy to provide people who do not submit a tax return with your contribution total.

ADAPTATIONS TO THE CELEBRATION OF MASS

With the resumption of Masses in our churches from this weekend, we have had to make a number of changes to ensure the health and safety of those who will be attending.

Please be aware of the following adaptations, which we will continue to monitor and revise where necessary:

- Only one Reader will be required. This is being organised on a week by week basis.
- Communion will only be distributed by the Priest Celebrant.
- Communion will only be distributed under one kind, ie. the Chalice will not be offered.
- Communion will only be distributed in the hand, not on the tongue.
- There will be no Procession of the Gifts.
- Collections will not be taken up. Instead, those attending will be invited to place their contributions in two clearly labelled receptacles as they enter the Church. Parishioners who wish to consider electronic contributions should contact the Regional Office for more information.
- The Sign of Peace will be given without physical contact, ie. with a bow, or a wave, etc.
- Printed bulletins will be available at the entrance to the Church – please collect your own and take it with you when you leave.
- Communal singing will not take place, though a small group or a single cantor may be present.

We look forward to the time when we can once again celebrate the fullness of our liturgical life. In the meantime, we much appreciate your understanding and acceptance of these necessary precautions.

Reflecting on Corpus Christi

Some years ago, Pope John Paul II went to Lima, Peru. There he was met by a massive crowd of two million people. Instead of the usual greetings from the President and the Cardinal, two people from a shantytown stepped forward to the microphone. Their names were Irene and Viktor Charo. As the huge crowd went quiet, they begin to speak to the Pope.

'Holy Father, we are hungry, we are sick, we lack work, our children die before their time. Yet we believe, Holy Father, we believe in the God of life. And we hunger for bread.' Before a hushed crowd, the Pope replied in his best Spanish. 'You tell me you hunger for bread.' 'Yes, yes', the millions yelled in reply. 'You tell me you hunger for God', said the Pope and again the crowd swelled with an emphatic 'Yes! Yes!' 'I want this hunger for God to remain; I want your hunger for bread to be satisfied.'

The Pope then turned to the generals and the wealthy politicians gathered there – many of them devout Catholics – and said very starkly, 'I won't simply say share what you have. I will say give it back. Give it back – it belongs to the poor.'

As extraordinary as the Pope's words were that day, Jesus' words about the Eucharist in today's Gospel are even more so. In the sixth chapter of John's Gospel many people were so horrified by the claims Jesus makes for the reality of his presence in the Eucharist, they stopped following him. John clearly links Jesus giving himself for the sake of God's kingdom and our redemption, with the communion we share with Him in every Mass.

When we receive the Risen Christ in communion it's not a symbol of his presence or a sign of his life to which we say 'Amen'. It is Christ who hosts us, who gives us himself so that we might be transformed into His image and likeness. In modern language Christ says to us at every Mass, 'Here I am, broken and poured out in love for you. Take me. I'm here for you.'

The danger with all gifts, and most especially with this gift, is that we can think it's just for us, an intimate moment between each of us and Christ. It is that, but it's also much more. St Augustine in a sermon on the Eucharist on 9th August 413 wrote that the Mass was about three things: goodness, unity and charity. Augustine taught that if we were not better people, working for unity and loving each other away from the Eucharist, it fails to achieve its purpose. Hence, like the Pope in Peru, many people have linked the reception of the Bread of Life here with the giving of bread which sustains life away from here. On average in our world 26,000 die every day of starvation. John F Kennedy observed in 1961, 'The only thing standing between us and the elimination of hunger is our desire to see it.' We could feed all the world's poor. We choose not to.

In a talk on the Eucharist, the then Jesuit General, Fr Pedro Arrupe said, 'while there is hunger in the world then our Eucharists are incomplete'. By this he didn't mean that when we gather for Mass anything is wrong. Rather he meant that when we gather around this holy table for this sacred meal while people still starve in the world, then something vital is lacking. There's an emptiness.

Yet it's an emptiness that invites us in. The God who comes to us at every Eucharist as real food is the same God that asks, 'When I was hungry, did you feed me?' This question says that just as God feeds us, so we too should and can feed each other.

May this feast of the Body and Blood of Christ give us the strength of our convictions. May the real food and drink we provide away from this sacred table prove to the world the power of the Eucharist to change us into a people that are good, unifying and loving. And may we not just share with the poor from our excesses, but give them back the food that is rightly theirs.
