COVID-19 AND THE EASING OF RESTRICTIONS

Further changes to the COVID-19 related restrictions have taken effect.

The general closure of church buildings is no longer required by the Public Health Order. It has been replaced by the imposition of limits on the number of persons who can be in the building at any one time. The number of persons who can be present in a church building for a wedding, funeral, memorial service or other religious service is to be determined on the basis of the '4 square metre' rule, ie. the maximum number of persons is the number that can be accommodated by allowing 4 square metres per person within the building.

These changes require the number of people who can attend a wedding, funeral, memorial or other religious service to be determined on a building by building basis, and that number may be less than the limits generally understood to be applicable.

This general limit is further regulated by providing a maximum number of persons who can attend these celebrations, as follows:

Weddings – up to 20 persons, excluding the persons being married, the celebrant and others required to facilitate the wedding service, one photographer and one videographer.

Funerals – More than 50 persons may attend, subject to certain conditions.

Memorial Services – up to 50 persons, excluding those necessary to conduct the service.

Religious Services (including Mass) – up to 50 persons, excluding those necessary to conduct the service.

The details (name, telephone number, and/or email) of any person participating in a wedding, funeral/memorial service or religious service (or a gathering immediately following these events) must be provided to the Parish Priest or delegate, who must record and keep the details for a period of four weeks. This is a mandatory requirement of the Order and it must be observed. The reason for a person being in a church building will not be recorded. The Order no longer requires the collection of contact details of those attending the church building for the purposes of private prayer.

The public celebration of Mass has recommenced in our diocese, with parishes taking all reasonable precautions in relation to hygiene and physical distancing. Please see the separate notice on page 4 of this bulletin, regarding the resumption of Masses in our region and the need to register your wish to attend.

Because of the limit on the number of people who may be able to attend any particular Mass, all members of the Church of the Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle, except priests, continue to be dispensed from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass.

ADAPTATIONS TO THE CELEBRATION OF MASS

With the resumption of Masses in our churches from this weekend, we have had to make a number of changes to ensure the health and safety of those who will be attending.

Please be aware of the following adaptations, which we will continue to monitor and revise where necessary:

- Only one Reader will be required. This is being organised on a week by week basis.
- Communion will only be distributed by the Priest Celebrant.
- Communion will only be distributed under one kind, ie. the Chalice will not be offered.
- Communion will only be distributed in the hand, not on the tongue.
- There will be no Procession of the Gifts.
- Collections will not be taken up. Instead, those attending will be invited to place their contributions in two clearly labelled receptacles as they enter the Church. Parishioners who wish to consider electronic contributions should contact the Regional Office for more information.
- The Sign of Peace will be given without physical contact, ie. with a bow, or a wave, etc.
- Printed bulletins will be available at the entrance to the Church – please collect your own and take it with you when you leave.
- Communal singing will not take place, though a small group or a single cantor may be present.

We look forward to the time when we can once again celebrate the fullness of our liturgical life. In the meantime, we much appreciate your understanding and acceptance of these necessary precautions.

Important Information regarding the Resumption of Masses

With the easing of COVID-19 related restrictions that took effect from 1 June 2020, it is now possible to resume the celebration of public Masses, subject to certain requirements.

For the Sacred Heart Cathedral, the celebration of Mass, both weekdays and weekends, has recommenced with effect from Tuesday 9 June 2020, subject to the requirements set out on the Cathedral website, www.sacredhearthamilton.org.au

Under the current regulations, the upper limit of attendance at Mass is **50 people** (excluding the celebrant and the people necessary for the conduct of the service). For weekday Masses this number should be easily accommodated, but Sunday Masses regularly attract more than the prescribed limit of 50 people. So that everyone who may wish to attend has an equal and equitable opportunity to attend, **registration in advance will be required.**

Registration to attend Sunday Mass in the Cathedral will open at 9am on the Monday beforehand, and close promptly at midday on the Friday immediately before the Sunday. Registration is valid only for one week; you must register separately for each subsequent Sunday.

To register your wish to attend one of the Sunday Masses in the Cathedral, you must do so by visiting the website, www.sacredhearthamilton.org.au, and clicking on the registration button on the right hand column. If you do not have the ability to register via the website, please contact the Regional Office on 49791101, or email newcparish@mn.catholic.org.au where staff will be able to do so on your behalf.

If the number wishing to attend is above the limit of 50 persons, a 'lottery' will determine those who will be able to attend Mass on that weekend. Those selected to attend will be contacted on Friday afternoon/evening. Only those whose names have been selected will be permitted entry to the church for each Mass. There will no exception to this requirement. You will be required to provide your telephone number and/or email address as part of the registration process. This is a requirement of the current Public Health Order, and there can be no exception made. When attending Mass, please have your name 'ticked off' the list that is being monitored by a volunteer.

Important to note! If you reach voicemail when you call to register for Mass, please leave your name and phone number and clearly dentify which Mass you wish to attend. We need to be able to contact you on Friday afternoon/evening, to confirm your attendance. We received some voicemail messages at the Regional Office this week where phone numbers were not provided and we could not complete the registration. We remind you that if you are not registered, you cannot attend Mass.

We thank you for your understanding during these difficult times and appreciate your continuing patience and support in relation to the registration requirements. These are processes we must follow in order to comply with the current Public Health Order.

If you do not require a tax receipt for tax purposes, it is preferable to refrain from requesting one, as this will enhance the tax deductibility for those who do use the tax receipt. I am happy to provide people who do not submit a tax return with your contribution total.

gospel foci

Anyone who welcomes

Having spelled out the difficulties of discipleship throughout Ch 10, the gospel writer has Jesus reassuring the disciples that anyone who welcomes them welcomes him. There are echoes here of other parts of the Gospel of Matthew: the Beatitudes, with its blessings on the poor and humble of heart; the welcome of children, the 'little ones' of the kingdom; and the Last Judgment (Mt 24), that reminds us that whatever we do for the least in the world we do for Jesus. Jesus even describes the disciples as 'little ones' - a reminder both to them and to those who welcome them.

First Reading

2 Kgs 4:8-11. 14-16

A reading from the second book of the Kings

That is the holy man of God, let him remain there.

One day as Elisha was on his way to Shunem, a woman of rank who lived there pressed him to stay and eat there. After this he always broke his journey for a meal when he passed that way. She said to her husband, 'Look, I am sure the man who is constantly passing our way must be a holy man of God. Let us build him a small room on the roof, and put him a bed in it, and a table and chair and lamp; whenever he comes to us he can rest there.'

One day when he came, he retired to the upper room and lay down. 'What can be done for her?' he asked. Gehazi (his servant) answered, 'Well, she has no son and her husband is old.' Elisha said, 'Call her.' The servant called her and she stood at the door. 'This time next year,' Elisha said 'you will hold a son in your arms.'

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans

Having been buried with him through baptism, we shall walk in a new life.

When we were baptised in Christ Jesus we were baptised in his death; in other words, when we were baptised we went into the tomb with him and joined him in death, so that as Christ was raised from the dead by the Father's glory, we too might live a new life.

But we believe that having died with Christ we shall return to life with him: Christ, as we know, having been raised from the dead will never die again. Death has no power over him any more. When he died, he died, once for all, to sin, so his life now is life with God; and in that way, you too must consider yourselves to be dead to sin but alive for God in Christ Jesus.

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Reflection by Richard Leonard

For all the great things the Church of yesteryear achieved, it also did some terrible things. One of the worst demands it made was that a Catholic who married a person who was not a Catholic did so at a side altar, oratory or in the sacristy of the Church. How humiliating this directive was. For how long were we going to punish the Protestant Reformers and young Catholic woman or man who fell in love with: someone from these denominations? In these ecumenical days, it's hard for us to understand these actions.

Today, especially at weddings, I hear older Catholics talk about this experience more than anything else. It's often given as the reason why the person or their family stopped practising their Catholic faith. Recently an older wedding guest told me that her wedding day at the side altar was the last day she came to the Church of her own free will. She never had her children baptised and her painful experience was still palpable forty years on as she compared and contrasted her wedding day with the Catholic marriage ceremony of a couple in a similar religious circumstance to her own which we had just celebrated. All I can do in such circumstances is apologise for the hurt our shortsightedness caused and be full of admiration for those who were subjected to similar treatment but have remained constant to our Catholic community.

These days inter-denominational marriages are rarely the reasons over which a family will divide. But we know that other religious issues can still break up a family. It's always a tragedy when this happens. For example, maybe you've had a son, daughter or a grandchild join a religious sect or cult. heartbreaking stuff for parents who wonder what their child sees in the sect and where it will all end.

The Church has sometimes let families down in this Appearing to prefer dogma complexities of people's lives, formal liturgy to creating communities of hospitality, care and justice, the church can appear to be out of touch, especially with our young. I know that every person in authority in the Church today knows that the Catholic Church needs to listen to our young people, hear about the issues that concern them and present our faith in a way they find accessible and engaging. Very often it's not what we say about our rich faith, it's how we say it. Many people don't leave the mainstream churches because they are attracted by another group's doctrine, though some do want the world to be very black and white. Many leave for smaller groups offering a tightly knit community.

From today's Gospel we know that the same family heartbreak occurred in the early church. At this time, however, Christianity was the small sect drawing believers away from Judaism, to acknowledge Jesus as the Messiah. It ripped families apart. The early church became the new family of many followers who were disowned. They lost their life and found a new one in Christ.

There can be moments when a family's lifestyle, beliefs, behaviour or values are such that one member feels that, in conscience, or by conviction, he or she does not belong anymore.

When this happens we can listen carefully to reasons the family member gives. Maybe we have lost something essential in our life together that needs challenging and change. And maybe it's the family member who is in the wrong.


Keeping the lines of communication open, speaking the truth with calmness and love and remaining as compassionate as possible are the best Christian responses.

I can't pretend that any of this is easy, but, when I have seen families do it, the prophetic, truthful and charitable rewards Jesus offers in today's Gospel are powerfully in evidence.
