REFLECTION BY GREG SUNTER

The three gospel accounts from the final three weeks
leading up to the season of Advent all come from
Chapter 25 of the Gospel of Matthew. They can be
seen together as an extended treatise on living life in
response to Jesus' message and preparing for the end
of time. This week's gospel starts out as a Kingdom
parable and becomes a bit more of a metaphor for
living a Christian life.

The gospel parable relates to ten bridesmaids – five
foolish and five wise – who are participating in a
wedding ritual that involves meeting the bridegroom
and escorting him the last part of his way to the
wedding reception. The foolish bridesmaids have not
brought sufficient reserves of oil for their lamps and
have to leave at the critical time to try to obtain
more. When they eventually arrive at the reception
hall they are turned away because they have shamed
themselves as well as the bride and groom by not
fulfilling their duty.

Some of the original audience of Matthew's gospel,
along with many of the early Christian followers, had
an expectation that Jesus was going to return and
usher in the end of the world in their lifetime. The
message of this gospel is captured in Jesus' final
words, 'So stay awake, because you do not know
either the day or the hour.' The timing of Jesus'
coming cannot be predicted and so all Christian
believers, like the bridesmaids, need to continue to
act with hope and expectation; being prepared for
the fact that it may be further off than anticipated.
Many early Christians were living their lives as though
the world would end at any time. The gospel warns
them, and us, to continue to follow the example of
Jesus and not to become complacent – expecting that
everything is about to come to an end.

Historical Context – Where was the bride?

It may seem a little odd that the bridegroom was
travelling to the wedding hall by himself. What
appears to have been the custom is that the
bridesmaids escorted the bride to the hall whilst the
groom remained behind to settle matters with the
bride's family. Whilst the bride price, or dowry, would
have been agreed well before the wedding, the family
would emphasise and even haggle over the value of
gifts to further reinforce the great value of the bride
and the wise choice that the groom and his family
had made.

COVID-19-RELATED INFORMATION

Maximum Number of Persons in Churches

Under the current Public Health Order, the limit on the number of persons who can be present in a church is now calculated as the lesser of allowing 4 square metres per person within the building, or 100 persons.

In our Region, those limits are:

Sacred Heart Cathedral	100
St Mary's, Newcastle	54
St Joseph's, The Junction	100
Mary Immaculate, Tighes Hill	55
St Laurence O'Toole, Broadmeadow	55
St Peter-in-Chains, Stockton	70
Christ the King, Mayfield West	70

The limit applies to all Masses and other liturgical celebrations, such as weddings and funerals.

Provision of Contact Details

The Public Health Order requires the collection of contact details for those who attend any liturgical celebration in a church (e.g. Mass, weddings, funerals, Baptisms, etc.). If a 'discrete' group attends, e.g. a family, a husband and wife, people from the same household etc., only one (adult) member of the group is required to provide their contact details.

The contact details that are required are defined as a) name, b) phone number or email address, and c) the time of arrival.

A Contact Details Form will be provided at the door to permit the collection of these details. The Cathedral also provides an 'online' version via SignIn.com.au which permits you to sign in via your mobile phone. If you have the Service NSW app on your phone, you can also use that to sign in at the Cathedral.

General Requirements

The requirements regarding cleaning, observing physical distancing, refraining from communal singing, etc. remain in place for the time being, as does the requirement to refrain from physical acts of devotion that involve touching or kissing icons or statues.

Liturgical rituals have been adapted, and will continue to be adapted, in order to ensure the health and safety of all parishioners and visitors to our churches.

We ask those who are particularly at risk – the elderly, those with compromised health, those who are sick – to refrain from returning to Mass for the sake of their own health. The dispensation from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass given by the Bishop remains in place in these circumstances.

Requirements for Attending Mass

Cathedral: There is no need to register in advance to attend Mass. If you wish to return to Mass, you are at liberty to do so, though capacity limits will need to be observed at all Masses.

St Mary's Newcastle & St Joseph's, The Junction: Registration in advance is required for Sunday Mass. To register, visit the Regional website, contact the Regional Office on 4979 1101, or email the Regional Office via newcparish@mn.catholic.org.au. **Please note that once you have registered you will only be contacted if you are UNABLE to attend Mass.**

Broadmeadow: Registration in advance is required. To register, please contact Gwen on 4967 5010, or Fr James on 0402 223415, or via email, jamesodoh768@yahoo.com.

Tighes Hill: Registration in advance is required. To register, please contact Fr James on 0402 223 415 or via email, jamesodoh768@yahoo.com.

IMPORTANT TO NOTE: If you reach voicemail when you call to register for Mass, **please leave your name and phone number and clearly identify which Mass you wish to attend.** We need to be able to contact you on Friday afternoon/evening to confirm your attendance. We remind you that if you are not registered, you are not able to attend Mass.

LIVE-STREAMING NOTICE – 9.30AM MASS FROM SACRED HEART CATHEDRAL The 9.30am Mass from Sacred Heart Cathedral is live-streamed (and recorded) each week. The camera is located under the choir loft and faces towards the sanctuary, though it can be directed to various parts of the Cathedral if needed.


Parishioners should be aware that they may be filmed during the celebration of the 9.30 am Mass. This filming will mostly capture their image from behind. We cannot guarantee, however, that their faces will not be featured on the live-stream or recording, particularly the case during the Communion Procession. The live-stream will make use of multiple camera angles to minimise the identification of individuals as much as possible, but this will not eliminate the possibility of being filmed.

Parishioners with concerns about being filmed or recorded should speak with the Cathedral Rector, Father Andrew Doohan, in the first instance.
