SACRAMENTAL PROGRAM ENROLLING NOW

In the Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle the Sacraments of Initiation for children are administered according to the diocesan policy '<u>Becoming Disciples</u>'.

Baptism is the first sacrament of Christian Initiation. In baptism we are made one with Christ and a member of the Church. We are claimed by Christ when we are marked with the sign of the cross



and joined to Christ as we are baptised with water – in the name of the Father, the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

We are anointed with oil, clothed in our baptismal garment and given our baptismal candle. All these actions are signs that we have committed ourselves to the life-long journey of putting on Christ and making the mind of Christ our own.

Confirmation is the second Sacrament of Christian Initiation. The Bishop, as leader of the diocesan Church community (or his



delegate) administers confirmation. Through the Laying on of Hands and Anointing with Chrism our baptismal commitment is confirmed. Through the gifts of the Holy Spirit – wisdom and understanding, counsel and fortitude, knowledge, piety and fear of the Lord – we are strengthened to live more truly and responsibly as disciples of Jesus and members of the Church committed to pursuing the mission of Jesus today.

The process of Christian Initiation is completed when the person comes to the table to receive communion for the first time.



As human beings, we live our lives within a vast network of signs and symbols, every word we speak, every gesture we make, every letter we read or voice we hear is a sign or symbol, designed to communicate, to express a message.

When people gather together, they invariably do something of a symbolic nature: celebrate an anniversary or a birthday, a wedding or a funeral. Religious rituals, or liturgies, belong to this same form of human ritual celebration.

The religions of the world bear testimony to many types of rituals: water rituals and rituals of initiation, ritual meals, and ritual sacrifices, atonement and healing rituals, marriage, funeral and ordination rituals. But only Christians call these Sacraments.

In the Catholic tradition, these formal ritual celebrations, or sacraments are messages of God's

love and presence at different stages of our lives. They are called: Baptism, Confirmation, Eucharist, Reconciliation (or Penance - formerly referred to as Confession), Anointing of the Sick, Holy Orders and Matrimony (Marriage).

In the years leading up to the Second Vatican Council, (1962-65) theologians reminded us that both Christ and the Church are the two basic sacraments from which all other Christian sacraments flow. Jesus Christ is the clearest sign and sacrament of God's saving presence in the world, and the members of the Christian Community, the Church, are meant to act as 'the face of Christ' to that same world.

ST BENEDICT'S PARISH SACRAMENTAL PROCESS

The Parish hosts a family-based and Parish-supported sacramental program for the children of our Parish, in conjunction with parents, who are the first educators of their children in the faith, We undertake the formation and education of children to receive the Sacraments of Reconciliation (Penance, formerly known as Confession), Confirmation, and First Communion.

The Parish works with parents to help them educate their children in the faith. In this, we are supported by the Principals and teachers in our four Primary Schools, together with our Parish Catechists who teach Special Religious Education in local State Schools.

This year, in trying to cope with COVID, preparation for the sacraments is fully online. While we understand this change may require some adjustment, we feel it's very important to keep everyone safe. The ceremonies wherein the children receive the three sacraments will, of course, be in person and not online.

The first step towards involving your child in the sacramental process is to register your interest by completing the online form:

http://www.newcastlecatholic.org.au/sacramental-

enrolment-form/ or contacting the Parish Office on 4979 1101. Once you enrol, you will receive an information packet, which will then assist you to log into MOODLE, which contains all the information about the program, and sign up forms for the ceremonies. Support is available for parents during this program 7 days per week.

If you registered for the 2020 Program your enrolment will be carried forward and you will be contacted in the next week.

The program will officially commence on March 1^{st.} If you would like to be part of the program, please enrol prior to Feb 28.

The Nicene Creed



REFLECTION BY RICHARD LEONARD

Sometimes translators of the Bible get it wrong for all the best reasons. We are used to hearing in today's Gospel that Jesus was 'filled with pity' when he encountered the leper, but the Greek word Mark uses is more accurately translated 'anger', not 'pity'. With the exception of the cleansing of the temple in John's Gospel, generations of translators found it hard to imagine Jesus angry. Jesus' anger, however, provides a wonderful insight into him, and a strong challenge to us.

Anger tells us that something is wrong. It is an important and valuable emotion. Anger is valueneutral. It's what we do with it that defines its effect in our lives. Some of us sit on it and stew. Others gain energy from their anger to right the wrong.

People who had any type of skin disease in first century Palestine were called lepers. They were treated shamefully. They had to live outside the villages and towns, call out 'unclean, unclean' when they came near others, could never attend the temple and were considered cursed by God and so excluded from the Chosen People. No wonder Jesus was angry when he encountered a man with leprosy. Here he also confronts a social class system that robbed this man of his human dignity and religious laws that robbed him of hope.

There are two details in this story that are especially important. The man with leprosy feels comfortable enough to go straight up to Jesus, to put his case, and ask for healing. We are told that Jesus touched him. Social and religious laws were being broken in this encounter. But Jesus' healing of the man isn't just about challenging social laws and taboos. Jesus tells the man to fulfil his religious obligations so that he can attend the temple again and rejoin the community. Jesus was interested in converting all those he met to the higher laws of love and compassion.

We are challenged this Sunday to trust our anger. This is not only about fighting for our rights when we have been wronged, but more so, it's fighting for the dignity and rights of others. It can take many forms: taking the life of those yet to be born, or who are near natural death, fighting for future generations by calling for a just care of the earth. And it can be about standing up for those people in our home, parish, workplace, neighbourhood, country and world who are treated shamefully, excluded, derided, or declared unclean.


Why should we bother? Because this Sunday Christ comes to us, again, and declares that despite what we might think about ourselves, or what we have been told, there is nothing in us which cannot be healed or is beyond hope. May this Eucharist give us the love and compassion of Christ to fight for others' dignity because of the dignity we have received from Him. May we trust our anger and pray that it be like that of Jesus, and so turn us into agents of change for a more just church and for a more just world.

Project Compassion Virtual Immersions

COVID-19-RELATED INFORMATION

Maximum Number of Persons in Churches

Under the current Public Health Order, the limit on the number of persons who can be present in a church is now calculated by allowing 2 square metres per person within the building.

In our Region, those limits are:

Sacred Heart Cathedral	220
St Mary's, Newcastle	108
St Joseph's, The Junction	200
Mary Immaculate, Tighes Hill	110
St Laurence O'Toole, Broadmeadow	110
St Peter-in-Chains, Stockton	140
Christ the King, Mayfield West	140

The limit applies to all Masses and other liturgical celebrations, such as weddings and funerals.

Provision of Contact Details

The Public Health Order requires the collection of contact details for those who attend any liturgical celebration in a church (e.g. Mass, weddings, funerals, Baptisms, etc.). If a 'discrete' group attends, e.g. a family, a husband and wife, people from the same household etc., only one (adult) member of the group is required to provide their contact details.

The contact details that are required are defined as a) name, b) phone number or email address, and c) the time of arrival.

A Contact Details Form will be provided at the door to permit the collection of these details. The Cathedral also provides an 'online' version via SignIn.com.au which permits you to sign in via your mobile phone. If you have the Service NSW app on your phone, you can also use that to sign in at the Cathedral.

General Requirements

The requirements regarding cleaning, observing physical distancing, refraining from communal singing, etc. remain in place for the time being, as does the requirement to refrain from physical acts of devotion that involve touching or kissing icons or statues.

Liturgical rituals have been adapted, and will continue to be adapted, in order to ensure the health and safety of all parishioners and visitors to our churches. We ask those who are particularly at risk – the elderly, those with compromised health, those who are sick – to refrain from returning to Mass for the sake of their own health. The dispensation from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass given by the Bishop remains in place in these circumstances.

Requirements for Attending Mass

Cathedral: There is no need to register in advance to attend Mass. If you wish to return to Mass, you are at liberty to do so, though capacity limits will need to be observed at all Masses.

LIVE-STREAMING NOTICE – 9.30AM MASS FROM

SACRED HEART CATHEDRAL The 9.30am Mass from Sacred Heart Cathedral is live-streamed (and recorded) each week. The camera is located under the choir loft and faces towards the sanctuary, though it can be directed to various parts of the Cathedral if needed.

Parishioners should be aware that they may be filmed during the celebration of the 9.30am Mass. This filming will mostly capture their image from behind. We cannot guarantee, however, that their faces will not be featured on the live-stream or recording, particularly the case during the Communion Procession. The live-stream will make use of multiple camera angles to minimise the identification of individuals as much as possible, but this will not eliminate the possibility of being filmed.

Parishioners with concerns about being filmed or recorded should speak with the Cathedral Rector, Father Andrew Doohan, in the first instance.
