My wife invited some people to dinner. At the table, she turned to our six-year-old daughter and said, "Would you like to say the blessing?" I wouldn't know what to say," she replied. "Just say what you hear Mommy say," my wife said. Our daughter bowed her head and said: "Dear Lord, why on earth did I invite all these people to dinner?"



WHO CAN SATISFY HUMAN APPETITES?

As you know, the Bedouins wander through the desert regions greatly depending on what they come across for food.

There is a type of tamarisk tree which grows in those regions and from it a honey-like substance exudes and drops to the ground. It perishes quickly but if gathered early it gives a wonderful boost to energy short-term. The Bedouin word for this is: 'mann'.

Notice how close this is to 'manna'. The Jewish people wandering in the desert were desperate with hunger and close to starvation. Next morning, manna!

So, perhaps, the manna was a natural phenomenon, like the quails that had come up into the camp the evening before. Nevertheless, both were an expression of Divine Providence in a perilous situation. It was indeed 'manna from heaven'.

God had satisfied their craving, their appetite for food. Appetites are good things. Sometimes in Catholic history they have been regarded as something to be suppressed, but actually they tell us what we need as human beings.

Our appetite for food and drink is a good thing and must be satisfied or our bodies will collapse through malnutrition.

Our appetite for affection and acceptance is a good thing and must be satisfied or we disintegrate socially. If we are fortunate, we will find companionship which satisfies that appetite.

The universal appetite for knowing where we are in the Big Picture of the universe is a good thing. Human beings have a desire to know the truth about Reality.

We ask, indeed is there a Big Picture? Who is the artist painting the Big Picture? What sort of work of art am I? Does this creative artist regard me as a unique work of art which is cherished enough to survive the apparent dissolution of death?

All these appetites, bodily, social and spiritual, need to be satisfied if we are to be fully human.

Our Lord Jesus Christ proclaims in today's Gospel that he is the satisfaction of our deepest human appetites. Jesus says: 'I am not like the manna which ordinarily perishes overnight. I am not like the manna of the ancient Jewish people given to them alone. I am the Bread from Heaven which gives life to the world.'

'To the world,' not to some particular tribe of human beings, but to the whole of humanity, indeed to the whole of creation. And the *life* is nothing less than participation in Divine Life: eternal life.

'I am the one who can nourish the world with Divine Life. I am the one who can fulfil the human desire to exist in creation in the way God intended.'

There are hundreds upon hundreds of people and organisations claiming that they can satisfy our hungers and thirsts as human beings.

You and I are challenged to take a stand (and a risk, because that is what faith is) and agree with the Gospel when it says that this itinerant Jewish preacher and healer is indeed 'the Bread of God who comes down from heaven and gives life to the world.'

Jesus Christ is the One, the only One, who can satisfy the real deep down hunger which each one of us has, the hunger for life beyond the seeming extinction of death.

We Catholic Christians make another profound act of faith at our Mass today.

The bread which is brought up at the Offertory: 'fruit of the earth and work of human hands', after invoking the Holy Spirit and speaking the words of consecration, is no longer short term food like the manna in the desert. It becomes for us the bread of life.

But, more than that, this heavenly bread which we receive in holy communion with our Risen Lord is the effective start of the process of transformation of the whole cosmos. St Paul says in Romans that the whole of creation is yearning to share in the resurrection life of Christ in a way beyond our imagining.

So at every Mass we are in the Real Presence of the One who gives life to the world.

HISTORICAL CONTEXT - BREAD

For thousands of years, bread has been a staple part of the human diet in many cultures. It is no accident that the image of Jesus as bread makes such a significant appearance in the gospel of John. For the Jews, like other Ancient Near Eastern cultures, bread was a vital mainstay of their diet. In the Bible, the word 'bread' often simply means all food – it was that important! For many, regular access to bread did equate to life. Bread also played a crucial role in religious practices, especially the Passover meal.

COVID-19-RELATED INFORMATION

**YOU MUST WEAR A MASK WHILE INSIDE THE CHURCH

Maximum Number of Persons in Churches

Under the current Public Health Order, the limit on the number of persons who can be present in a church is now calculated by allowing 4 square metres per person within the building.

In our Region, those limits are:

Sacred Heart Cathedral 110 St Mary's, Newcastle 54 St Joseph's, The Junction 100 Mary Immaculate, Tighes Hill 55 St Peter-in-Chains, Stockton 70 Christ the King, Mayfield West 70

The limit applies to all Masses and other liturgical celebrations, such as weddings and funerals.

Provision of Contact Details

The Public Health Order requires the collection of contact details for those who attend any liturgical celebration in a church (e.g. Mass, weddings, funerals, Baptisms, etc.).

The contact details that are required are defined as a) name, b) phone number or email address, and c) the time of arrival. These details must be recorded for each attendee.

Attendees are able to use the Service NSW QR Code to provide their details—just like many other places—using the Service NSW app on your phone, or via a QR Code reader. A Contact Details Form will be provided at the door to permit the collection of these details.

General Requirements


The requirements regarding cleaning, observing physical distancing, etc. remain in place for the time being, as does the requirement to refrain from physical acts of devotion that involve touching or kissing icons or statues.

Liturgical rituals have been adapted, and will continue to be adapted, in order to ensure the health and safety of all parishioners and visitors to our churches. We ask those who are particularly at risk – the elderly, those with compromised health, those who are sick – to refrain from returning to Mass for the sake of their own health. The dispensation from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass given by the Bishop remains in place in these circumstances.
