

OUR ROADMAP TO RE-OPENING CHURCHES

From Fr Andrew's statement about the plan to open the churches on our Parish:

PHASE ONE: The first stage of reopening commences tomorrow, as 70% of eligible people are fully vaccinated. We would be entitled to reopen our churches at this point but only to those who are fully vaccinated. To reopen, we would need to exclude people: those who haven't completed the vaccination process, those who may be medically compromised, or those who have chosen for whatever reason not to be vaccinated as yet. For that reason, it has been decided not to reopen at 70%, but to await the next milestone before we reopen our churches to the public and for the celebration of public Masses and other liturgies.

PHASE TWO: When 80% are fully vaccinated (estimated date of 25 October) The state expects to reach 80% fully vaccinated around 25 October. We will reopen our churches and public liturgies to "mixed congregations" (i.e. to the fully vaccinated, the partially vaccinated, and the as yet unvaccinated) at this point. It is widely expected that many of the restrictions we are currently familiar with will continue. It is believed that the 4sqm rule will be applicable, and the wearing of masks indoors will be required. There will be a need to observe physical distancing, practice hand sanitising, and provide good ventilation in our churches. It is also expected that congregational singing will not be possible, though a small choir of ten are allowed to sing. We will not be required to check the vaccination status of people attending our churches. Those who are especially vulnerable, or who are vaccinated but anxious about mixing with the unvaccinated, or who unvaccinated and do not want to risk contact with others, will be free to remain at home; live-streaming of Masses from Sacred Heart Cathedral and other parishes will continue. We will take all reasonable steps to protect those who choose to gather in our churches.

PHASE THREE: When 90% are fully vaccinated (estimated date of 1 December) – "The New Normal" The NSW Government has advised that from 1 December, there will be no difference between COVID safety requirements for all NSW citizens, whether fully vaccinated, partially vaccinated or unvaccinated.

It is expected that at this milestone, the 2sqm rule will apply to all indoor religious gatherings, and there will

be no limit on the numbers at outdoor events (though COVID Safe plans will be required for outdoor events with more than 1,000 people attending). It is expected that masks will no longer be mandatory inside a church, though some people may wear masks for added protection if they choose. The Importance of Getting Vaccinated The Catholic Bishops of Australia, amongst many others, have highlighted the importance of being vaccinated against COVID. Their information can be readily accessible by visiting the Catholic Bishops' website (www.catholic.org.au/coronavirus). information must be available to those who have concerns about or are anxious about receiving a vaccination. The Bishops' statement is an excellent place to start for those undecided about receiving a vaccination. When considering receiving vaccination or not, people of good faith should ensure that they consider the good of the broader community when making their decision. It is not simply a question of the individual but of the whole community. As Pope Francis has said, it is an act of love to receive a vaccination in the face of a pandemic. The Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle wishes encourage all members of the diocesan community to be vaccinated and will endeavour to provide them with good information to inform their choice. We will offer them particular care since they, and certain vulnerable others, will be most at risk. We will also provide specific care to those who, though fully vaccinated, are anxious about gathering with a "mixed congregation". Further details and clarifications of arrangements, restrictions and any necessary measures will be developed in due course and communicated as quickly as possible. We look forward to being once again able to gather for Mass and other liturgies. Yet, we remain committed to ensuring that our actions are responsible and attentive to the need to contribute to the efforts to protect everyone who lives in the community, especially those who are the most vulnerable in the face of COVID.

This Sunday's readings confront us with the need to make choices in life, choices for God. They also remind us that no significant choice is without its price. However, if we make the right choice, we are assured that we will be richly rewarded.

We all want to be happy in life. We just don't always know which doors to open, and how far to enter them. We need wisdom for that. The more options that are open to us, the more difficult it is to choose, but choose we must. To choose one option is to relinquish the others. The young man in the gospel wanted eternal life. Surely there is nothing more worthy than that. However, the price he was asked to pay was more than he had expected, and he went away saddened. To choose is to face the consequences of the word of God, and sometimes this is as sharp as a two-edged sword.

We are asked to relinquish all of the things that we value, and we get them back a hundredfold. We are invited to take a step into the unknown. We are told that we will not fall. However, we are never sure of this until we take the step and discover that we have not fallen. God demands so much, but gives so much more.

The rich suffer want and go hungry, but those who seek the Lord lack no blessing.

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One of the latest appeal letters distributed by Catholic Mission focuses on the story of Kusa, a 5-year-old boy whose mother Samorn* is being supported by a kindergarten centre in Bangkok, in Thailand. The kindergarten is an initiative of the Good Shepherd Sisters who, like Jesus reminds his followers, affirm the importance of "receiving one child" in His name. As October, the time when the Church celebrates World Mission Month, approaches, let us turn our hearts and minds – and perhaps our financial assistance – to the missionary work that the Catholic Church does with, and for, children around the world, including Thailand. There are those within the ranks of Christianity who preach what is sometimes referred to as a 'gospel of prosperity'. They claim that wealth is a sign of favor, or approval, from God. They feel that if a Christian person is wealthy then they must be living a 'good' life that God is rewarding through material possession. They use this as justification for further accumulation of wealth. We can see from today's gospel that Jesus would have something to say about such an interpretation! Jesus reminds us that our reward is not in this world in the form of wealth and material possessions, but in eternal life.

BUILDING BRIDGES: Reaching out to our LGBTQUIA+ community with James Martin SJ

Globally, people who are LGBTQIA+ are at increased risk of depression, suicide, and verbal, physical and sexual harassment and abuse. James recognised a lack of Church advocacy on these issues following the 2016 Orlando nightclub shooting in the USA, noticing that few Catholic Bishops publicly spoke out about the massacre.

This prompted him to consider how the Church could better minister to LGBTQIA+ Catholics, discussed in his book, Building a Bridge: How the Catholic Church and the LGBT Community Can Enter into a Relationship of Respect, Compassion, and Sensitivity (2017).



ON CAMELS AND NEEDLES:

Some commentaries say the Aramaic word for "rope" (kamilon) was almost identical to the Greek word for "camel" (kamelon). If the word was misspelled, Jesus may have been making an analogy to threading a thick rope through the eye of a needle, not a large animal. Other commentators suggest that, at that time, there was a type of small gate called a needle. While it was tricky to get a camel through that gate, it was not impossible. Both suggestions point to a very, very difficult task, but one that could be accomplished.
