OUR ROADMAP TO RE-OPENING CHURCHES

PHASE TWO: Now 80% are fully vaccinated the churches are reopened for public liturgies with "mixed congregations" (i.e. to the fully vaccinated, the partially vaccinated, and the as yet unvaccinated). Many of the restrictions we are currently familiar with will continue. The 4sqm rule is applicable, and the wearing of masks indoors is required. There will be a need to observe physical distancing, practice hand sanitising, and provide good ventilation in our churches. Congregational singing is not be permitted, though a small choir of ten are allowed to sing. We will not be required to check the vaccination status of people attending our churches. Those who are especially vulnerable, or who are vaccinated but anxious about mixing with the unvaccinated, or who are unvaccinated and do not want to risk contact with others, will be free to remain at home; live-streaming of Masses from Sacred Heart Cathedral and other parishes will continue. We will take all reasonable steps to protect those who choose to gather in our churches.

PHASE THREE: When 90% are fully vaccinated (estimated date of 1 December) – "The New Normal" The NSW Government has advised that from 1 December, there will be no difference between COVID safety requirements for all NSW citizens, whether fully vaccinated, partially vaccinated or unvaccinated.

It is expected that at this milestone, the 2sgm rule will apply to all indoor religious gatherings, and there will be no limit on the numbers at outdoor events (though COVID Safe plans will be required for outdoor events with more than 1,000 people attending). It is expected that masks will no longer be mandatory inside a church, though some people may wear masks for added protection if they choose. The Importance of Getting Vaccinated The Catholic Bishops of Australia, amongst many others, have highlighted the importance of being vaccinated against COVID. Their information can be readily accessible by visiting the Bishops' website (www.catholic.org.au/ coronavirus). Good information must be available to those who have concerns about or are anxious about receiving a vaccination. The Bishops' statement is an excellent place to start for those undecided about receiving a vaccination. When considering receiving a vaccination or not, people of good faith should ensure that they consider the good of the broader community when making their decision. It is not simply a question of the individual but of the whole community. As Pope Francis has said, it is an act of love to receive a vaccination in the face of a

pandemic. The Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle wishes to encourage all members of the diocesan community to be vaccinated and will endeavour to provide them with good information to inform their choice. We will offer them particular care since they, and certain vulnerable others, will be most at risk. We will also provide specific care to those who, though fully vaccinated, are anxious about gathering with a "mixed congregation". **Further** clarifications of arrangements, restrictions and any necessary measures will be developed in due course and communicated as quickly as possible. We look forward to being once again able to gather for Mass and other liturgies. Yet, we remain committed to ensuring that our actions are responsible and attentive to the need to contribute to the efforts to protect everyone who lives in the community, especially those who are the most vulnerable in the face of COVID.

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Reflection

ANGELIC SWORDS OF LIGHT

The first reading and the Gospel speak of angels. So, so will I. What springs to mind? Have you ever seen those pictures of angels – like babies with delicate gossamer wings and usually with lots of pink and eggshell blue colouring?

How sentimental, how pathetically trivial, how untrue.

Angels are more like the light-swords wielded by Luke Skywalker in Star Wars. The good angels are lightning flashes of energy serving God's purpose in the battle against evil forces which can seem to dominate our worlds, private and social.

God loved us into existence in order to share in his life, but there are forces at work trying to frustrate that. There is a cosmic-scaled battle going on. Who is on our side in that battle?

The angels. Who are they?

Consider God's tremendous creativity, erupting the material world into existence, apparently billions of years ago: the giraffe, the stars, the platypus, you – and me!

Fantastic, but why should we limit God's creative imagination to variants on material existents? What about im-material beings, non-bodily beings of great intelligence and power, and like us, free to love or resist God's plan for the whole of creation?

Those are the angels, and those who have chosen to love and serve God are on our side.

Some are princes amongst the angelic beings who serve God. We hear of one in the first reading: '... Michael, the great Prince who stands guard over your

people." Others are our individual, personal Guardian Angels.

Others are our individual, personal Guardian Angels, so that when powers of darkness seem to engulf us, we can turn to our Guardian Angel and say: 'Fight for me', and that light-sword of God will engage in battle because that is that sort of angel's way of serving God.

That is on the personal level. But, the same battle is being waged on the larger social and political scale. For whole societies and nations it can be as though the sun is darkened. There seems to be no source of light and energy giving hope.

And yet the central fact of our faith assures us that the darkening of the sun is not the last word.

We read elsewhere in the Gospels that when Jesus was crucified, done to death on the Cross, 'the Sun was darkened'. But, three days later, out of the inky blackness of the tomb Our Lord emerged victorious and his empty tomb was flanked by angelic figures.

That is what gives us confidence that the worldwide battle being waged by the forces of evil will not have the ultimate success.

Our Lord Jesus Christ with his angel-warriors, his swords of light led by Michael the Archangel, 'the great Prince who stands guard over your people', will have the final decisive victory for all peoples.

At the *end* of history, the Gospel tells us that our Lord Jesus Christ will require the angels to gather us in to the Heavenly Jerusalem.

In the *meantime*, let us engage in the battle of our earthly existence with confident hope. The good angels are on our side.

God the Creator, Sustainer, and Transformer of the Cosmos wields his Light-swords – for *us*.

In response to a request from the Synod Working Party, Pastoral Ministries has prepared an Advent resource for our diocese. It's called, *Waiting with Purpose*. In doing this we took note of the voice of the faithful heard in the Synod process expressing a longing for different forms of prayer that include faith sharing.

Waiting with Purpose

As we continue our Synodal journey an Advent resource, *Waiting with Purpose* has been created for our diocese. *Waiting with Purpose* responds to the voices heard during Synod reflections of longing for different forms of prayer that include faith sharing.

Waiting with Purpose invites us to use Mystagogical Reflection as our way of encountering Christ in the Advent gospels. It invites us to focus on the presence of Christ in our experience and in the living tradition of our faith, to connect it to life now and to be changed by it. Mystagogical reflection meets us where we are. No preparation is needed. It's about being open to encountering Christ so we can live from Christ. It's deeply personal and communal.

The GCMC was conceived for professionals in Catholic institutions and related agencies who wish to enhance their understanding of the Christian and Catholic context in which they exercise leadership.


