

Waiting with Purpose invites us to use Mystagogical Reflection as our way of encountering Christ in the Advent gospels. It invites us to focus on the presence of Christ in our experience and in the living tradition of our faith, to connect it to life now and to be changed by it. Mystagogical reflection meets us where we are. No preparation is needed. It's about being open to encountering Christ so we can live from Christ.

REFLECTION BY JOSEF WALKER

It is probably safe to say that we have all had the experience of eagerly anticipating some upcoming event in our life. We imagined how great it would be when "it" — whatever it was — finally happened or arrived. The closer we got to the actual day of the event, the more excited we became. You may have been waiting for the birth of a child, or graduation or a special vacation, or retirement. Or you may have been waiting to overcome some challenge in life such as counting down the appointments to the end of chemotherapy or the days of physical rehabilitation from a broken hip. In that case, you were eager to be healthy and be able to fully enjoy life again.

If you are like many people at this point in the season, you may be about ready to wrap up Advent and to unwrap Christmas presents. You are looking forward to a beautiful Christmas Eve Mass and eager to observe family traditions around the table or tree. Or if you are one of those folks who is just tired of Christmas music in the stores, well, hold on, your patience will soon be rewarded.

For many of us, our day-to-day experiences of anticipation do not offer much insight into the ancient Israelites waiting for the messiah. The magnitude and scale of their longing and expectation is beyond our comprehension. Generation after generation, they yearned for peace and harmony in their own land and with their neighbors. Age upon age, they prayed that God would send the shepherd that we heard Micah describe in our first reading. The prophet, like those before him, assured the people that "he shall be peace."

To recall Israel's history of faithful expectation helps us better appreciate the potency that Luke seeks to convey in today's Gospel. In these few, brief lines, we hear that Israel's long-awaited Savior and his herald are not only already in the womb but now are even under the same roof. Through the power of the Holy Spirit what might have been an unremarkable family visit on an ordinary day in a rural village becomes the intersection of two periods of human history. Elizabeth, with John the Baptist in her womb, embodies the former generations. She bears the prophet who will point the way to the promised one. Mary, with Jesus in her womb, embodies a new beginning. She bears the transforming fulfilment of Emmanuel — God with us.

Luke describes the meeting of these two women as being charged with excitement. Anticipation is palpable in every phrase. Mary travels "in haste." John "leaped" in his mother's womb. Elizabeth is "filled with the Holy Spirit." Then she exclaims to Mary, "Blessed are you who believed," celebrating Mary's faithfulness to God's plan for humanity's salvation which is unfolding right before their very eyes.

As we listen to this Gospel, we are swept up in the euphoria that was so evident in Elizabeth's home. We can imagine how Luke's first audiences must have delighted in this story. Jesus was the answer to their ancestors' prayers. Through baptism, those early Christians were called and gifted to continue his mission bringing God's peace and grace to the whole world. As are each of us.

We, too, are called and gifted to continue Jesus' mission, which brings us back to these culminating moments of this Advent. This final Sunday of the season encourages us to discover those places in our own life and relationships where we can more fully experience — and express — God's love. In a similar way, this short span of days is symbolic of those in our community and around the world who long to know the peace, hope and joy of Christmas. As Mary rushed to share her excitement with Elizabeth, let us as individuals, parish communities and as the universal church hurry to share Jesus' love with those who are waiting and eager to know him.

Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee; blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus. Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death.

Elizabeth's greeting to Mary forms the second portion of the traditional prayer, the Hail Mary. The first portion of the prayer also comes from Luke's gospel and is the greeting of the angel Gabriel to Mary at the Annunciation. The final portion was framed by the Church. Use of the Hail Mary dates to about the 11th Century.



REFLECTION BY RICHARD LEONARD

The visitation is one of the moving scenes in the Gospel. On a human level, here are two cousins, unexpectedly pregnant in the most extraordinary circumstances, meeting and offering each other greetings and support. We can see the scene and feel the bond.

In the Gospel of Luke this moment is pivotal. These women meet in the mountains where God has always been manifest to the Israelites. Elizabeth is the Old Covenant made to Israel and she carries John who will be the herald of the Messiah. Mary, literally, embodies the new, and final, covenant in Jesus.

Elizabeth recognises what is happening here and she embraces all that God is doing for the world. She has tasted the promise of God and now sees its fulfilment.

On a more mundane level, however, a meeting like this would have occasioned much comment and speculation from those outside the inner circle. We only have to imagine it happening today in any small suburb or country town for us to appreciate the human scale of the unfolding drama.

The Iona Community has explored the unwritten history in their story of Mmes Matthew, Mark and Luke, 'The village gossips'.

Narrator: In any small village, news travels quickly. Therefore it is only to be expected that the strange changes in the lives of Mary and Elizabeth might have been food for other people's thought.

Mrs Matthew: Well, ladies, you know how I'm not one for gossip, but wait until you hear this. You know that old woman Elizabeth, with the man who has not spoken for nine months.

Mrs Mark: Yes, what about them?

Mrs Matthew: They say she's had a little boy.

Mrs Luke: At her age? She's 88 if she's a day!

Mrs Matthew: Well, that's what I heard and it was on

very good authority!

Mrs Luke: Are you sure you've got the right woman?

You're not mixing her up with her cousin?

Mrs Mark: Who? Mary?

Mrs Luke: That's her! Now, I'm not one for talking about anybody but wait until I tell you this. She's pregnant!

Mrs Mark: Never! How do you know?
Mrs Luke: You can tell. You can just tell.

Mrs Matthew: Oh yes, you can tell all right. I heard her in the store last week asking for a dress eight sizes too big for her.

Mrs Luke: There you are. Draw your own conclusions. Now, I know that this will not go any further, but I hear that she and a certain young man are planning to leave the district.

Mrs Matthew: Who is the young man?

Mrs Luke: The joiner's boy, Joseph.

Mrs Mark: Never!

Mrs Luke: Well, that's what they say and I'm not one

for gossip.

Mrs Mark: So, have you heard what they're saying

about the so-called census?

Mrs Matthew: No. Tell us.

Mrs Mark: Well, I happened to hear that the reason the Romans want our names is not to send us birthday

cards.

Mrs Luke: Well, why are they having a census?

Mrs Mark: To register us for a 'poll tax'.

Mrs Matthew: I heard it was a 'community charge'.

Mrs Mark: 'A rose by any other name.'

Mrs Luke: They wouldn't do that, would they?

Mrs Mark: Well I'm just warning you. Mind, I'm not

one for gossip.

Mrs Luke: Nor me.

Mrs Matthew: Nor me.

The story of the visitation keeps the rumour going that just when we think we can figure God out, predict how God will enter our lives and our world, he does something none of us can imagine. And the best thing about this rumour is — it's true.

As we wait for Christmas to come again into our lives, let's make room for Jesus Christ who turns our expectations upside down and always gives the gossips plenty to talk about.

"O ANTIPHONS" OF ADVENT

The "O Antiphons" are a series of seven antiphons beginning with "O", that are used in the octave (seven days) leading up to Christmas Eve, with a different antiphon proclaimed each day. They use ancient biblical imagery drawn from the messianic hopes of the Old Testament to proclaim the coming Christ as the fulfillment not only of Old Testament hopes, but present ones as well. Their repeated use of the imperative "Come!" embodies the longing of all for the Divine Messiah. The hymn O Come, O Come Emmanuel is based on the O Antiphons.

On the last days of Advent, you may wish to add these "O Antiphons" to your evening prayer, your prayer at table, or your bedtime prayer.

DECEMBER 17 O Wisdom of our God Most High, guiding creation with power and love: come to teach us the path of knowledge!

DECEMBER 18 O Leader of the House of Israel, giver of the Law to Moses on Sinai: come to rescue us with your mighty power!

DECEMBER 19 O Root of Jesse's stem, sign of God's love for all his people: come to save us without delay!

DECEMBER 20 O Key of David, opening the gates of God's eternal Kingdom: come and free the prisoners of darkness!

DECEMBER 21 O Radiant Dawn, splendour of eternal light, sun of justice: come and shine on those who dwell in darkness and in the shadow of death.

DECEMBER 22 O King of all nations and keystone of the Church: come and save man, whom you formed from the dust!

DECEMBER 23 O Emmanuel, our King and Giver of Law: come to save us, Lord our God!

When Mary went to visit Elizabeth she was not looking for a sign that she had made the right decision. Rather, because she had accepted God's will the sign was given to her. Her acceptance and action came first. The sign came later as a confirmation. At times we look to God to provide us with a sign that our impending action is the right choice. However, faith acts in trust and confidence; it doesn't wait around for a green light from God. When we do act in faith, the flow-on effects are the sign of confirmation.
