The cross icon which is at the centre of the devotional service is an adaption of the San Damiano cross of St. Francis of Assisi and is used at the Ecumenical Prayer Services conducted in Taize, France, and, anywhere else in the world where prayer services in the Spirit of Taize are conducted such as the one here. This cross icon, whatever its size or represented form as available, remains the focal point of every Taize Prayer service wherever it is held throughout the world. Taizé is a small village located in eastern France, near Lyon. The Taizé community founded in 1940 by Roger Louis Schutz-Marsauche (known as 'Brother Roger') is ecumenical with a strong devotion to peace and justice through prayer and meditation. The Taize movement remains resolutely ecumenical, bringing together people from all denominations and cultures.

Prayer and silence are at the heart of the Taizé experience. We are encouraged to live out the Christian gospel in a spirit of joy, simplicity and reconciliation.

A cross, a Taizé adapted version of the San Damiano cross remains a focal point. The singing of repeated prayer chants during candlelit prayer services is one of its trademarks. Taizé music highlights simple phrases, usually lines from the Psalms or other pieces of scripture, repeated or sung in canon. The repetition is designed to help meditation and prayer.

Note that there are some adjustments given the current context and where musicians and singers may not be available for the service to have the performance presented live as would normally happen. Professionally recorded music both instrumental and vocal are used instead.

If there are no technical glitches, this can be very effective in creating the right atmosphere of calm and receptivity. So we will be aiming for that. Adjustments in seating arrangements, room configuration and lighting can all happen as we develop the plans for the prayer service to work as best it can in the future.

An Overview ...

Taizé services have been conducted here in Newcastle for many years. What is it all about?

"...the Spirit too comes to the aid of our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought."

St. Paul to the Romans.

Many symbols, some ritual, silence, and a lot of stillness. Prayer from the heart, music, readings, petitions, meditative, reflective atmosphere, a spiritual connectedness. Darkened shared space, candlelight and repetitive chants; harmonies, music, no celebrant, an order of service, shared supper and shared experiences.

Taizé is a small village located in eastern France. The *Taizé* community founded in 1940 by Roger Schutz is ecumenical with a focus on peace and justice. Prayer and silence are at the heart of the *Taizé* experience.

So what is it that draws people to this kind of service?



How do they answer my question of how does it make you feel?

The Taize Prayer service allows our heart and mind to be open to The Lord...

It is a way of worship which is meditative in a way that the usual form is not. It allows you time for your heart and mind to be open to the Lord for an extended time. The music really opened up a new way to pray. Candlelight creates a quietening of the heart.

It is the attraction of linking into chants in various languages to remind you that the Christian tradition, which we all share, is not only an ancient one going back 2,000 years which has influenced the course of western civilisation but also, manifests itself in various cultures.

It brings a connectedness to others worshipping in the same way throughout the world. Gives opportunity to participate with others in a meaningful, reflective way. It's non-passive with ritual, symbolism and participation.

The music really opened up a new way to pray.

I like its simplicity.

It's very spiritual.

I find it very peaceful.

REFLECTION

Have you noticed how many books, films, television and radio programs harken back to yesteryear? 'Retrospectives' are huge in the art world. Have you noticed when musicians play more romantic classical music in the first half and contemporary music in the second half that people leave at half time? It seems the public likes the art of the 19th Century more than that of today. Nostalgia is big business and we cannot get enough of it.

Nostalgia literarily means 'a yearning for home'. And if our artistic tastes reveal anything about who we are at present, maybe the home we yearn for is where things are clearer, roles are more defined, accepted harmony is developed and discord and dissonance is avoided – at least in public.

In today's Gospel, Jesus says that as a result of our love for him and fidelity to his word, the Father will come and make a home with us. The image of God as homemaker is, sadly, not very developed in Christian spirituality, maybe because too many undomesticated men have had too much of the say for far too long! But this is an image that holds a lot for how and where we meet God.

The best homes are places where we relax because we are ourselves, we are known and we know the others with whom we live. It's a common experience, for example, that when we have been out from our homes, as soon as we enter our front door we want to go to the loo. There is something intimate and familiar about our home that enables us to relax on many levels as we turn the key. Home is an earthy place where we don't get away with much and our vulnerability can be on display. Christian homes are particularly hospitable places, where Christ dwells in them to the degree that dignity, love and forgiveness are present.

A home, however, is more than a house in which people live. Homes need work and attention. A friend of mine says memories rarely just happen, they need to be created. That's the sort of attention to a family's life that turns a house into a home.

And this is the world in which God enters our lives. God wants us to be relaxed and vulnerable in God's presence. We don't need to put on a show or say what we think God wants to hear, that's a theatre where we preform, not a home where we know each other. Easter faith is about being comfortable and intimate, about being who we are, rather than the persona we would prefer God to see.

As with most of our homes, being at home with God has its ups and downs, days when we think we cannot bear to stay one more moment, other days where we could never imagine being anywhere else and then most days where we are neither up nor down and we just get on with the routine of our lives. God the homemaker remains faithful through it all, offering the gift of Easter peace, sending us out to proclaim Christ's Kingdom, welcoming us home eager to learn how everything went and reassuring us always that while God is at home with us our hearts should never be troubled and we are not to be afraid.

For Christians, nostalgia is not about living in the past, it is about yearning for the sort of home where our heart truly is.




Peace
