TODAY'S GOSPEL—A DIFFERENT VIEW

Feminist theologian Elizabeth Schussler Fiorenza suggests that the story in today's Gospel is less about an event in the life of Jesus than it is about events in the life of the early Church. In the first 30 to 40 years after the death of Jesus, women played an equal role in leadership and ministry to the community. However, by the time of Luke's gospel, men were becoming more dominant in the community. By portraying Jesus as admonishing Martha's active service and praising Mary's passive listening role, the passage can be interpreted as endorsing the relegation of women to less active roles.



REFLECTION

A Queensland grazier, a Sydney stockbroker, and a woman barrister from Melbourne died and were standing in line, waiting for their chance at the entrance to Heaven.

St Peter called the grazier first. 'We have only one simple requirement for entrance here,' St Peter said, 'You must spell "God".' 'Easy enough,' said the bloke from Queensland, 'G-O-D.' And he entered Heaven.

Next, St Peter called the man from Sydney. 'We have only one simple requirement for entrance here,' he said. 'You must spell "God".' 'No problem,' said the stockbroker, 'G-O-D.' And he went in.

Finally, the woman barrister approached St Peter. 'Good riddance to the world,' she said. 'My whole life, I've tried to excel in a male-dominated society, only to continuously bump into the proverbial "glass ceilings" at every point. I can't tell you, St Peter, how glad I am finally to be rid of male chauvinism.'

'Well, you'll certainly find none of that here,' said St Peter. 'I'm sure you'll enjoy heaven, if you can meet this one simple requirement for entrance. You must spell "Czechoslovakia".'

One of the things I find reassuring about today's Gospel is that the Church seems to have been wrestling with women's leadership since the very beginning. It's the issue that will not go away.

When it comes to interpreting scripture, I am always pleased that I'm a Catholic. We're not fundamentalists or literalists. We believe that the truth of the scripture lies not just in the words themselves, but also in the careful interpretation of the text in history. The story of Martha and Mary is a complex narrative. It can be read on at least two levels.

The first level is extraordinary enough: it focuses on Mary who assumes the position of the Rabbi's student and is defended against any attack on her right to be there. In first century Palestine, Jewish women were 'not permitted to be taught the Torah, but only instructed about how they should live their lives in obedience to its demands. They were not permitted to touch the scriptures nor to take part in public debate or official liturgical ritual.' (Fitzmyer, Luke p.892) From this context we can see the sort of freedom Jesus envisaged for women, against the practice of his own day.

On another level, however, this story focuses on Martha. The writer of Luke's Gospel tells us that we are in Martha's home and, that with Jesus as special guest at table, she is serving the members of her household with care and devotion. Martha comes across as strong and outspoken. Mary, meanwhile, is passive and silent. It is likely this story is criticising a call in Luke's community for women to move away from the leadership Jesus gave them and to adopt again the traditional roles to which the Jewish/ Christians were more familiar.

At the Vatican on 21 May 2000 the Pope told a group of Bishops from the USA: 'The genius of women must be ever more a vital strength of the Church of the next millennium, just as it was in the first communities of Christ's disciples.'

To that end today's story from such a community holds a key to our own dilemma. Just as Jesus broke through the gender boundaries of his own day, so too must we. We must renew our commitment to ending anything that degrades, exploits or dehumanises women throughout the world.

But more, it's time for the Church to take some strong symbolic and practical steps to defend the leadership of women within our own Catholic community. For example, Church teaching does not stand in the way of re-admitting lay people, and this time lay women, into the College of Cardinals; women could continue to assume high profile positions in each Diocese and also leaderships roles within the Roman Curia, starting with those departments that deal with instructions and decisions that directly affect them; and the Church could welcome the ordination of women as Deacons.

These avenues would enable women to have even more options for them to demonstrate and realise the full extent of their genius, as the Pope puts it.

At this Eucharist, then, let us recommit ourselves to using, in the best possible way for the mission of the Church, the gifts, talents and strengths of over half our community. May we learn from the earliest Church, described in today's Gospel, 'that which is the better part' and never 'take it away from her.'

FROM TUESDAY'S WITH TERESA (ON THE DIOCESAN WEBSITE)

This past week, the Second General Assembly of the Fifth Plenary Council of Australia (July 3-9, 2022) was held, and I am conscious that on Day 3 the deliberative vote on some of the motions for Part 4 – *Witnessing to the Equal Dignity of Women and Men*, failed to pass. Women, some men, and clergy stood silently, a move which disrupted the proceedings.

One of the rejected motions mentioned "ensuring that women are appropriately represented in decision-making structures of Church governance at the parish, diocese or eparchy, and national level, and in Church agencies" and "ensuring, through formal policies and intentional practice, that the experiences and perspectives of women are heard, considered and valued".

This sense of pain, discontent and hurt was followed by the re-drafting of five motions supporting equal dignity of women and men in the Church, which on Friday, passed both the consultative and deliberative votes at the Plenary Council. It was noted that the Holy Spirit was both a comforter and a disrupter.

There were eight parts which the members of the Plenary Council considered during the week:

Part 1 – Reconciliation: Healing Wounds, Receiving Gifts

Part 2 – Choosing Repentance – Seeking Healing

Part 3 – Called by Christ – Sent Forth as Missionary Disciples

Part 4 – Witnessing the Equal Dignity of Women and Men

Part 5 – Communion in Grace: Sacrament to the World Part 6 – Formation and Leadership for Mission and Ministry

Part 7 – At the Service of Communion, Participation, and Mission: Governance

Part 8 – Integral Ecology and Conversion for the Sake of our Common Home

The agenda and motions of the second assembly drew together the fruits of four years of prayer, listening, dialogue and discernment, which have been the marks of this long Plenary journey.

This process has been an expression of the synodality that Pope Francis has identified as a key dimension of the Church's life in the third millennium. Synodality is the way of being a pilgrim Church, a Church that journeys together and listens together, so that we might more faithfully act together in responding to our God-given vocation and mission. This journey of synodality will re-shape our engagement with the world, our evangelising mission and our works of service in a rapidly changing environment.

The seeds have been sown and now we wait and participate in their flourishing. The outcomes of the

Plenary Council will continue to inform our own diocesan synodal journey.

The Pastoral Constitution on the Church in the Modern World, *Gaudium et Spes* reminds us.

Inspired by no earthly ambition, the Church seeks but a solitary goal: to carry forward the work of Christ under the lead of the befriending Spirit. And Christ entered this world to give witness to the truth, to rescue and not to sit in judgment, to serve and not to be served... To carry out such a task, the Church has always had the duty of scrutinizing the signs of the times and of interpreting them in the light of the Gospel. (3-4)

Fr Richard Lennan, provided input on Day 4 (6 July) on Communion in Grace: Sacrament to the World. He spoke about our liturgical sacramental life, portraying it as a way in which we grow as communion and grace. I share some of his talk:

- 1. Grace is the self-expression of God, the gift of God's own life and therefore gives life. Grace is abundant and we live and move and have our being in grace. This invites us to an ongoing permanent relationship with God.
- 2. Grace is God's initiative and mediates what is not of God to mediate God - that is the notion of sacramentality. This has a history which begins in the covenants of Israel. So, the land, the law and the prophets become genuine encounters with God and are therefore sacramental. This reaches its fullness in Jesus Christ. Jesus is grace in human form and the healing grace of God is present in us as one like us; to comfort, to encourage, to feed, and to forgive. And through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus, we as human beings and a human community in the whole of human history are reconciled to God and given the promise of a future fulfillment in God. What God accomplishes in Jesus continues through the gift of the Holy Spirit, the fullness of the trinitarian revelation of God. What the Spirit does is gather together a community of faith and witness in Jesus Christ, that's us, that's the church. The Church exists to be sacrament of God's love, to make present that love of God in our world. As church we are not perfect, rather we are continually called to mission and conversion.
- 3. If we are to be a community that manifests grace, we need to be nurtured in grace, and that gets us to the sacramental and liturgical life of the church. We need to be people nurtured by the Word of God, by our sacraments, by our communal life, by our personal prayer, by our being together and sharing faith, and through that we can grow as a community that makes manifest God's justice in our world.

4. The Church which exists to manifest this grace, has to be a community open to its own conversion, so that we are constantly seeking how might we make this love of God present more fruitfully. So how might our liturgies better reflect this lifegiving love of God. How will the motions help us to grow as a community transparent to the grace of God, a community more able to witness to the hope that we have in Christ.

We are called to mediate God's grace to our world in this time and place. I wonder how we are going at doing this. Over to all of us to make this real!!!! Thank you to the 277 members of the Plenary Council, to the facilitation team, to all the organisers and many others for all the work of last week. We have witnessed a moment in history.
