FROM THE MODERATOR

Dear Brothers & Sisters in Christ,



I am pleased to announce the arrival of Father Paul Chackanikunnel to the Newcastle City Pastoral Region. Fr Paul is originally from Kerala in India, was ordained to the priesthood in December 2000 and came to Australia in 2006. He then served for 5 years in the Wilcannia-Forbes Diocese and then 11 years in the Archdiocese of Brisbane, before just recently coming to Newcastle. With all this experience, along with his considerable academic qualifications and warm pastoral manner, his coming to assist us here in this time of declining clergy numbers is a great blessing from God. Paul is currently undergoing final induction processes but will begin presiding at Sunday Masses across our region from this weekend. He will also be assisting with weekday Masses, funerals and the other sacraments. Please feel free to introduce yourself to Fr Paul and join me, our office staff and parish teams, in making him feel very welcome.

Fr Paul Chackanikunnel CMI is a religious priest belonging to the Order of 'Carmelites of Mary Immaculate' (CMI) founded by St. Kuriakose Elias Chavara, the first indigenous Order of India in 1831. The order has over eighteen hundred priests working in more than 31 countries worldwide and around twelve hundred students in seminary in formation.

Fr Paul was born on 7th January 1971, in a middle class family as the eldest son of Mr John and Mrs Mary Chackānikunnel. He has two brothers and two sisters who all are settled in Kerala, India. In 1986, at the age of 15, Fr Paul joined the Order and completed his Higher Secondary education, graduations, and other required religious studies for priesthood. He was ordained on 26 December 2000.

After ordination, Fr Paul was asked to start a school at Kanghangad, North of Kerala State where the CMIs had no educational institutions. By the end of 2004, basic facilities and all accreditations from the Government Educational Authorities had been achieved. He left the school in 2005 to complete his Master's degree in Economics. When he left as the Founding Principal of Christ CMI Public School, it had 700 children from prep to year 9. It has now grown to year 12 with around 1300 students.

While preparing for his Masters, his provincial superior

received an invitation from the Bishop of Wilcannia-Forbes Diocese requesting a couple of priests to assist him in pastoral ministries in his diocese. In response to his invitation, Fr Paul agreed to come to Australia with another priest from the Order, Fr Sunny Mathew and arrived in 2006. After a month's initial training at Forbes, he was appointed to Bourke.

When asked of his readiness to be appointed at Bourke, he responded did not know much about Bourke or its nuances. With the humility and gentleness of a missionary priest, especially as a new arrival from overseas, he consented to go to Bourke.

After arriving there, he realized that 'Bourke is nowhere from everywhere'. However, very quickly he became familiar with the new cultural environment and the language, including the expression 'Back O' Bourke'. His stay at Bourke was a blessing, helping him to learn the both the Aboriginal Cultures and the Australian (Language). Along with the culture and linguistic differences, what amazed him most in Australia was the breadth and length of this continent and consequently the travel distances, especially when driving through unsealed country roads for hundreds of kilometers to reach the remote out back communities.

Scarcity of Priests in Australia and his ability to adapt to his living situations reasonably well were the reasons for his long stay in Australia. As the CMI Order gets on average 50 ordinations every year, Fr Paul's return to his previous ministry in India, was not necessary - and he was needed in Australia. Fr Paul's pastoral and administrative qualifications gave him many skills and helped him to be a parish priest in country parishes rather easily.

After his appointment at Wentworth (the Junction, Murray and Darling Rivers) in 2008, his second parish in Australia, the diocese was undergoing a challenge to its existence as a mission diocese. After Bishop C. Toohey resigned in 2009, there were proposals to suppress the diocese and to divide it between the neighbouring dioceses. Because of this uncertainty, Fr Paul's religious superiors or the diocesan office at Forbes were not keen to renew the contract for him to continue his service in the diocese of Wilcannia-Forbes.

The Archdiocese of Brisbane had already requested priests from the CMI Order, and Fr. Paul's religious superior asked him if he was willing to move to Brisbane as part of his future. He agreed to this request and was appointed at Woodford and three years later at Hendra.

SETTLEMENT SERVICES INTERNATIONAL SEARCHES FOR RENTAL PROPERTIES

Over the coming month, more than 60 people from refugee backgrounds are arriving in Newcastle, and Settlement Services International (SSI) are struggling to secure enough on-arrival accommodation to house them. The regional housing crisis that is affecting our whole community is having a significant impact on their ability to welcome people into our community. At this stage it looks like they may need to redirect families to Sydney. Can you help?

SSI is looking for houses or units that can fit families of two to seven people, or some single bedroom units. Some of these rental properties will be "head leased" by SSI Group and used as on-arrival accommodation. Others may be rented directly to families from refugee backgrounds already here, and free up some of our existing on-arrival accommodation. 

REFLECTION

Jesus and Satan have an argument as to who is the better computer programmer. This goes on for a few hours until they agree to hold a contest with God as the judge.

They set themselves before their computers and begin. They type furiously for several hours, lines of code streaming up and down the screen.

Seconds before the end of the competition, a bolt of lightning strikes, taking out the electricity. Moments later, the power is restored, and God announces that the contest is over. He asks Satan to show what he has come up with.

Satan is visibly upset, and cries, 'I have nothing! I lost it all when the power went out.'

'Very well, then,' says God, 'let us see if Jesus fared any better.'

Jesus enters a command, and the screen comes to life in vivid display, the voices of an angelic choir pour forth from the speakers.

Satan is astonished. He stutters, 'But how? I lost everything, yet Jesus' program is intact! How did he do it?'

God looks up over his glasses and chuckles, 'Ah you see, Jesus saves.'

Salvation has, rightly, always been the big issue. Who was going to make it, how it was going to happen and when would Christ return in glory have captured the imagination of each generation of believers.

The roots of this thinking can be found in today's Gospel. The earliest Christians, especially the Gentiles, saw that the Jews had been given every opportunity for salvation. They were the Chosen people. They had the Law and the Prophets. They were looking for the Messiah. Jesus, however, did not come as they expected or act as they hoped, so they rejected him and his followers. Within a generation after Jesus' death the Jews were persecuting the Christians and expelling them from the synagogues. The Christians took comfort from saying that in the salvation race the Jews might have started as the favourites, but they had missed the start and were now coming last.

This way of thinking had a strong effect on the Church. While we have always believed in the mercy and love of God, at different times we have been hostile to other religions, other denominations and the secular world. We have often needed to express this in absolute terms about who was going to be saved and, more importantly, who was not!

The Second Vatican Council, however, reflected on the Church's experience of working side by side with religious people and secular humanists throughout the world who were as committed as we are to justice, love and freedom. In the 'Declaration on the relationship of the Church to non-Christian religions', the bishops thought more generously about how God has a relationship with all people who in turn relate to God, even if they do not name it in the same way we are able to. The Council did not resile from believing that Jesus is the way to the Father, but they also affirmed that God can work in an infinite number of ways to assist people to salvation. It is Church teaching now that our relationship to all people who share the best of our values must be characterised by acceptance, collaboration, dialogue and charity.

This does not make salvation any less important. It just clarifies for us that it is God, not us, who does the saving and the judging. Christian salvation marks us out as people who know who we are following, where we are going, how we are getting there and why this world, and the next, matters to us. Salvation gives our lives meaning, direction and purpose.

The way we live out this salvation should be irresistible to others. As the folk hymn sings, 'They will know we are Christians by our love, by our love. Yes, they'll know we are Christians by our love.'
