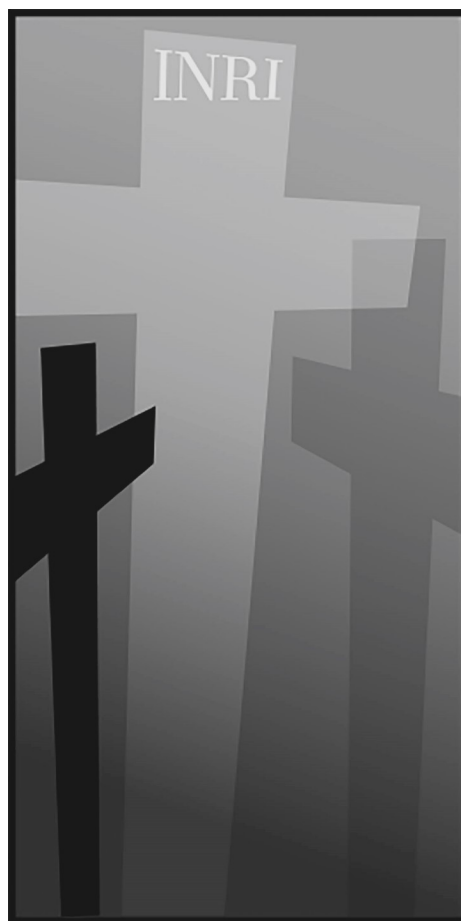

RELAXATION OF COVID RESTRICTIONS IN CHURCHES

Due to a relaxation of COVID safety precautions across many areas of public life in recent months, the Diocesan Liturgy Council has recommended easing many of the restrictions that were in place in churches over the past couple of years. Accordingly, after consulting with our Regional Pastoral Council and Cathedral staff, I am pleased to announce the following:

1. Holy Water may be re-introduced into the Holy Water stoups at the entrances of our churches. I have asked that this water be changed weekly
2. During Sunday Masses the Gifts may be brought forward by volunteers, as was the practice before COVID
3. Greeters and Hospitality Ministers should feel free to resume their former roles of making everyone welcome at the entrances of our churches
4. Collection plates/bag may be passed along pews once again during Mass as occurred prior to COVID. As our parishes have struggled financially since the start of the pandemic, I ask you to be as generous as you can.

At this stage, the Australian Catholic Bishops have asked parishes to delay in re-introducing the sharing from the Chalice at Mass due to a recent spike in new COVID cases.

Those who wish to receive Communion on the tongue are welcome to do so, but are urged to come forward at the end of the Communion procession to mitigate any risk to others.

Despite these relaxations, individuals should feel free to continue wearing masks in Mass if they so choose. And sanitiser will continue to be available in our churches. Also, no-one should feel any compulsion to bless themselves with the Holy Water from the stoups. Although it is pious practice, it has always been voluntary and remains so.

RED WEDNESDAY

Since 2018, *Aid to the Church in Need* (ACN) Australia has joined commemorations around the world for Red Wednesday. Red Wednesday is an initiative of ACN to pray for, and draw attention to, Christians who suffer and are persecuted for their faith. Notre Dame in Paris; the British Houses of Parliament and the Colosseum in Rome, are some of the landmarks that have participated by lighting their facades in red. Several Australian dioceses have also participated in recent years including Sydney, Hobart, Melbourne, Broken Bay, and us!

ACN will also be launching its *Persecuted and Forgotten Report*. The report will cover about 25 countries and will have a reporting period ending 30/09/22. It will be a global survey of persecution and oppression of Christians, with an emphasis on those places where the problem is worst.

REFLECTION

Stephen Spielberg's film *A.I.* opens in the near future when couples are permitted only one child. Families also have robots, but the makers of these robots have not yet been able to get them to ape human feelings. Professor Hobby develops David, a robotic boy who 'is able to love'. Hobby's question is, 'Will human beings love him back?' Henry and Monica's only son is in danger of death. They are selected as David's first foster parents. They grow to love him until their son recovers and comes home. David is then abandoned, but he spends the rest of the film trying to regain the love he has known.

David is caught between being robotic and human because he develops a memory, at least he remembers what is like to be loved by Monica. Spielberg seems to argue strongly in this film that memory is ensoulment. It makes us who we are. It gives us our spirit, our human compass. The film's insight is important. It might be set in the future, but it is a commentary on the present debates about DNA recreation and cloning. Spielberg is right in as much as *A.I.* argues that we can never have a clone or copy of someone because each person is made up of his or her memories.

Memory is powerful. It is often one of the last faculties to go in the human brain. It can be so strong that decades after an event people can recall an experience as though it were yesterday. This recollection can bring back strong feelings, which makes us laugh at the pleasure or weep over an unhealed hurt.

As insightful as Spielberg's theology of the human person in *A.I.* may be, it is inadequate for Christians. We all know people who have limited or no memory and some, tragically, who since birth are unable to communicate whatever they can remember. For Stephen Spielberg these people could be less human than we are. But for Christians it doesn't matter if we remember or not, our soul or spirit is that which is alive to God's memory. We are privileged to know that God remembers us.

In today's Gospel the good thief simply asks Jesus to 'remember me'. And Jesus tells him that being remembered by God is paradise. It's a wonderful way to understand the Kingship of Christ. We know that Christ our King is not about earthly power, land, buildings, riches or might. We know Jesus' Kingship is not about lording it over us, or making us frightened of his compassionate judgment. The power of Christ

the King is seen in his memory, holding every person in this world close; calling each one of us by name.

What a feastday! The final day of the church's year is when we remember the saving memory of God!

So in this Eucharist let's join our voice with all those who long for paradise and say, 'Jesus, remember me when you come into your Kingdom.'

Shepherds and Criminals

The gospel of Luke is underlined by a message of hope for those who are afflicted, outcast and poor. In this gospel, the message and ministry of Jesus are directed specifically to these lowly ones. The significance of the role played by the poor is highlighted by the framing of the whole narrative in this gospel: the birth of Jesus is celebrated by shepherds and his death is accompanied by criminals. Shepherds and criminals – two classes of people on the absolute fringe of society; not dignitaries or wise men from afar – are witness to the birth and death of Jesus.

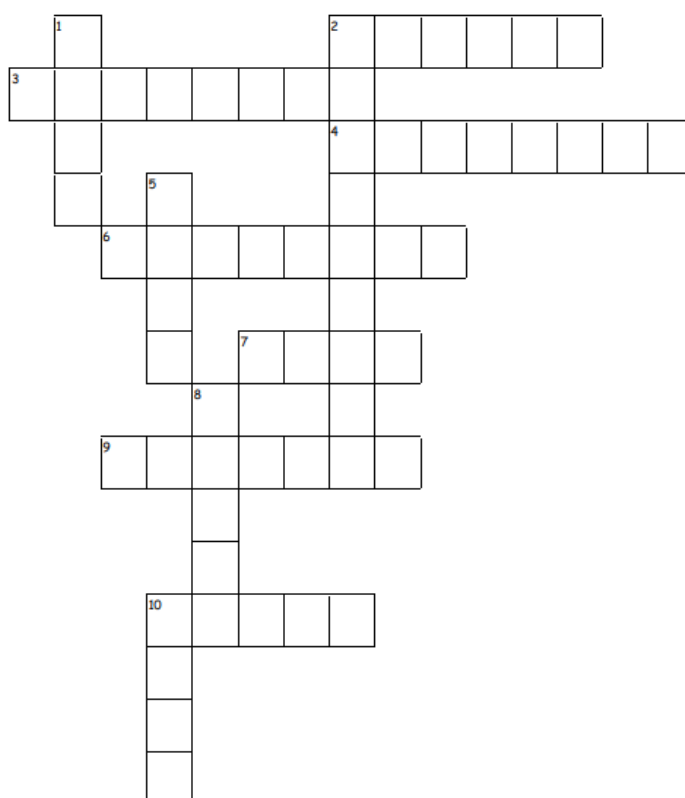

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FIRST AND SECOND COLLECTIONS

WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE?

Each weekend at our parish Masses, there are two collections. The 1st collection immediately follows the Prayers of the Faithful, while the timing of the 2nd collection may vary (either immediately following the 1st collection, or after communion).

THE FIRST COLLECTION provides, in the first place, for the priests of the parish: their monthly stipend, household food expenses, cooking and cleaning expenses. Funds surplus to the local priests' needs are forwarded to a central fund, which provides for the health care of priests and for the care and upkeep of retired priests and the Bishop. Surplus funds do not stay within your parish.

THE SECOND COLLECTION provides the income for all the running expenses of your parish - staff employment, insurance, maintenance, maintaining and operating the Regional Office and the Churches, liturgical supplies, waste collection and, most importantly, parish and regional ministries and services. Surplus funds stay in your parish and are invested to meet the parish's future needs.

First Collection: Currently the only way to contribute to the 1st collection is via a weekly cash contribution to the collection plate.

Second Collection: There are various ways to contribute to the 2nd collection:

1. **Cash** donations on the 2nd collection plate.
2. **Weekly Envelopes** (known as the planned giving scheme) which are placed in the 2nd collection each weekend during Mass. Contributions made via Planned Giving can be offset against any Catholic School Building Levy you may be liable for, when you have one or more children attend a Catholic Primary or High School.
3. **Automated contributions** via your credit card or direct debit. The Catholic Development Fund can make a charge to your nominated credit card or bank account on a monthly, fortnightly or weekly basis according to a signed authority, offering a 'set and forget' option for contributions. Of course you can withdraw your authorisation for these contributions at any time. This type of planned giving is also an eligible offset to the School Building Levy.

Many Catholic diocesan and parish works currently helping those in need in the Hunter region are made possible by bequests. Each of us finds different ways to make our mark on the world. One way of doing this is by making a bequest. A bequest is a gift left in a will. When you leave a bequest to the Church, you give a gift that lasts longer than your lifetime, a gift that will always be remembered.

Since 1841 the Catholic Church has been meeting the material and spiritual needs of the people of the Hunter. That need is always growing. The work of the Catholic Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle in the parishes of the Newcastle, Mayfield and Stockton Region takes many forms.

After providing for your family, a bequest to your parish is a special way of ensuring the work of the Church in the parishes of the City Pastoral Region continues. Depending on family situations, some bequests are large and some are small, but all are vital to the work of the Church. Please consider donating to your parish to ensure that the work of spreading the message of Jesus Christ can continue
