FROM THE MODERATOR

It's Time to elect a New Pastoral Council for the City Pastoral Region

The City Pastoral Region comprises the Parishes of St Benedict's Inner Newcastle, Christ the King Mayfield and St Peter in Chains Stockton. The St Benedict's Inner Newcastle Parish includes Sacred Heart Cathedral Hamilton, St Mary's Newcastle, St



Joseph's The Junction and The Immaculate Heart of Mary Tighes Hill. As a community of communities, these Parishes cover a wide geographic region and a broad range of people.

The Regional Pastoral Council, sensitive to the pastoral needs of the people and area in which the Region exists, strives to discern effective ways to serve those pastoral needs that we may witness to the presence of Jesus Christ, the Risen Lord in this portion of the Lord's vineyard by the gift and power of the Holy Spirit

The Pastoral Council under the authority of the Moderator, Fr John Lovell in cooperation with his fellow clergy, will be responsible for assessing those matters which concern the pastoral works of the Parishes of the Region and proposing a Regional Pastoral Plan to direct and facilitate those works.

The Pastoral Council is composed of:

- The Moderator
- All clergy appointed to the Parishes of the City Pastoral Region
- The Principals of our Parish Schools or their delegates
- Any other person designated by the Moderator as holding an office engaged in Pastoral Care within the Parishes of the Region
- A total of 8 parishioners representing each Sunday Mass of the Sunday Mass communities, as determined by that community
- A total of 5 parishioners can be appointed by the Moderator for the term defined in their letter of appointment
- One member from the Parish Finance Council
- Sacramental Program Director

All members of the Pastoral Council are required to have a current Working With Children Check and have completed a National Police Check. All members must also complete the Diocesan Safeguarding Course 2. These requirements do not have to be in place for nomination, but if elected, then the new member will be required to complete these requirements.

In February we will be calling for nominations for representatives from our 8 Mass communities:

- 4. St Marys, Newcastle

- 7. The Immaculate Heart of Mary, Tighes Hill
- 8. Christ the King, Mayfield

Following the acceptance of nominations, the names of nominees will be published in the Bulletin and elections will take place in March. The term of appointment is 3 years. SEASONS FOR GROWTH

No season lasts forever, not even winter.

Our lives, like the seasons, are constantly changing. These changes often involve many losses and deep grief. Learning how to recognise and adapt to the stressful events and changed circumstances we experience, as well as the ongoing challenges these may bring helps to bring peace and hope into our lives. The Seasons for Growth small group, peer-based educational program offers the opportunity for individual reflection and group discussion by gently and symbolically using the metaphor of the seasons to support adults to:

- **Learn** about how different people respond to change, loss and grief
- **Understand** that it is normal to experience a range of grief reactions
- **Explore** new approaches to dealing with change, loss and grief in their lives
- Build communication, decision making and problem solving skills
- Participate in a supportive network of peers and adults
- **Integrate** their new learning into their relationships with family, friends and others.

REFLECTION JESUS OUTCAST FOR US

Lepers were social outcasts forced to live 'outside the camp', outside the villages and towns, outside where nobody lived.

This was the true horror and misery of their disease. They were cut off and isolated from human contact, calling out 'Unclean, Unclean!'

They could neither enjoy human company nor join in communal worship at synagogue or Temple.

Into this situation, Jesus comes on to the scene. A leper appeals to Him to be cured.

Breaking all the taboos, Jesus reaches out and touches the leper. This cures the skin disease. More importantly, this heals the man. What divided him from human society is overcome. He can return to the town, enjoy companionship, and worship God in the local synagogue.

I have said that the leper had to eke out an existence outside his village or town.

How does our gospel passage conclude? 'Jesus . . . had to stay outside in places where nobody lived.' *Jesus had* to stay outside in places where nobody lived!

Jesus has changed places with the leper!

Of course, Jesus had not contracted the disease but he had broken the Jewish law which forbade touching a leper. That was enough to put him on the outer with the villages and towns of Galilee. Jesus willingly changed places with the leper.

This incident prefigures the deepest mystery and scandal of the Gospel.

When we are alienated, cut off, at a distance from other people or God because of some deliberate wrongdoing on our part, or because of our failure to act with courage or compassion in some situation,

that is, when we have sinned and have the sense of being 'on the outside' with God

Our Lord and Saviour willingly takes our place. Where did Jesus end up?

On the hill of Calvary. And where is Mt Calvary?

Outside the city, outside the city walls of Jerusalem in a desolate place where nobody lived.

On that hill, Jesus experienced all the alienation, all the sense of distance from the Father, all the 'outsider' status which comes from sin,

sin committed by anyone, anywhere, at any time, in human history.

He willingly took it all into his own body and human psyche. So much so that he cried out: 'My God, my God, why have you abandoned me?'

That is the extent, that is the measure, that is the limitless measure to which the Son of God was prepared to go.

He took our place *outside* the awareness of the loving presence of His Heavenly Father.

Why? So that we can live without the dis-locating consequences of sin. So that we might be located in the *right* place, *insiders* with God.

At every Mass, we are in the right place. Here we can call out with the leper, appealing to Jesus to heal us. And Our Lord will reach out and touch us so that we are healed.

Monsignor Professor Tomas Halik, the 'underground priest' who converted to Catholicism as an adult and was secretly ordained a priest in 1978 during the communist rule of then-Czechoslovakia is in Australia to give a series of lectures as part of the Bishop Vincent Presents series. The conversation will be moderated by leading academic and priest, Fr Frank Brennan SJ AO.

A renowned public intellectual, philosopher, sociologist and priest, Halik is known for being a leading voice against Soviet communism in the 1980s (he was persecuted by the secret police as an "enemy of the regime") and was co-responsible for the revival of the Czech Catholic Church after the fall of communism.


