POPE FRANCIS ON THE JUBILEE YEAR

"We must fan the flame of hope that has been given us, and help everyone to gain new strength and certainty by looking to the future with an open spirit, a trusting heart and far-sighted vision. The forthcoming Jubilee can contribute greatly to restoring a climate of hope and trust as a prelude to the renewal and rebirth that we so urgently desire; that is why I have chosen as the motto of the Jubilee, Pilgrims of Hope. This will indeed be the case if we are capable of recovering a sense of universal fraternity and refuse to turn a blind eye to the tragedy of rampant poverty that prevents millions of men, women, young people and children from living in a manner worthy of our human dignity...."

The spiritual dimension of the Jubilee, which calls for conversion, should also embrace these fundamental aspects of our life in society as part of a coherent whole. In the realization that all of us are pilgrims on this earth, which the Lord has charged us to till and keep (cf. Gen 2:15), may we never fail, in the course of our sojourn, to contemplate the beauty of creation and care for our common home. It is my hope that the coming Jubilee Year will be celebrated and experienced with this intention too. Growing numbers of men and women, including many young people and children, have come to realize that care for creation is an essential expression of our faith in God and our obedience to his will."

FROM THE PARISH PRIEST

Dear Parish Family,

A warm and heartfelt welcome to all those visiting the Cathedral and this parish this weekend.

As you know the Diocese is taking a very active role in our participation in the Jubilee Year 2025. The invitation to be a 'Pilgrim of Hope' has gone out to the entire world and we here in the City Pastoral Region have amazing opportunities to take that invitation seriously. We have two of the eight pilgrim sites, Sacred Heart Cathedral and St Mary on the Hill. There will be opportunities on the day of the walk and throughout the Jubilee Year to collect a very nicely prepared Pilgrim Passport. Looks and feels like the-real-deal. You will have read the bishop's letter and heard the invitation to visit each of the pilgrim sites across the Diocese and receive an Indulgence. If you haven't seen the other parts of the Diocese now is the year to do it!

I am hoping that you might feel able to take a turn at one or both of our sites as a welcomer and help stamp the pilgrim passports as the pilgrims visit. In the not-too-distant future a roster will go out for you to sign up and be part of this exciting time. You will find that you will meet amazing people and form lasting friendships along the way. And an opportunity to share insights into our parish communities with those from other parishes as you stamp their passport. There will be opportunities too for prayer, adoration and coming together in our Churches throughout the Jubilee Year.

This is the first year in my 31 years of priesthood that I haven't invited you to return the palms you had blessed last year on Palm Sunday and return them in readiness for use in the Ash Wednesday liturgies. I feel a bit sad about that to be honest. My palm sits behind the arms of Christ on the Cross in my room. At Boolaroo, the palm was on the Crucifix in the front foyer of the Presbytery. Hopefully, your blessed branches were in similar and sacred places in your home. Throughout the year 'they' will have seen your graces, some of your challenges, some of your issues and some of your sins! I've loved the act of creating the ashes from those palms and then using them as together we *'repent in sack cloth and ashes.'*

Please don't throw those palms out. Take a minute or two to respectfully place them in your garden on Ash Wednesday. You'll be ready then for the new blessed palms you will get this Palm Sunday. There are lots of



opportunities for Masses on Ash Wednesday. See the bulletin for details.

Thinking of all the connections of our symbols. We use green branches in Advent and theoretically the Advent wreath should be made from fresh greenery. We take away all our colour and greenery throughout Lent up until Palm Sunday when we again bring in green branches and wave our branches and sing to the King. Then on Good Friday we take those green branches as they then become the wood upon which Christ died. From birth to death. Remember we don't eat meat on Ash Wednesday and for those that can it is also a wonderful day for fasting: food, social media, apps and devices, or unkind words and actions!

WHAT IS A JUBILEE?

A Jubilee is a special year of grace and conversion, involving prayer, pilgrimage and sacramental repentance, held every 25 years, or during other years as called for by the Pope.

The most recent (ordinary) Jubilee celebrated was the Great Jubilee of 2000. The most recent Extraordinary Jubilee Year was 2015, the Holy Year of Mercy.

Jubilee celebration has biblical roots. A Jubilee year was to be marked every 50 years, since this would be an "extra" year, one which would happen every seven weeks of seven years, i.e., every 49 years (cf. Leviticus 25:8-13). It was intended to be marked as a time to re-establish a proper relationship with God, with one another, and with all of creation, and involved the forgiveness of debts, the return of misappropriated land, and a fallow period for the fields.

In 1300, Pope Boniface VIII called the first Jubilee, also known as a "Holy Year," since it is a time in which God's holiness transforms us. The frequency of Holy Years has changed over time: at first, they were celebrated every 100 years; later, in 1343 Pope Clement VI reduced the gap between Jubilees to every 50 years, and in 1470 Pope Paul II made it every 25 years. There have also been "extraordinary" Holy Years: for example, in 2015 Pope Francis proclaimed the Year of Mercy as an extraordinary jubilee. The way in which Jubilee Years are marked has also changed through the centuries: originally the Holy Year consisted of a pilgrimage to the Roman Basilicas of St. Peter and St. Paul, later other signs were added, such as the Holy Door. By participating in the Holy Year, one is granted a plenary indulgence.

Through a series of concrete rituals, acts and commitments, the goal of a Jubilee year is to inspire and encourage holiness of life among the faithful and therefore to strengthen the Church's witness to God's loving mercy in and for the world.

During the 2025 Jubilee Year Pope Francis has encouraged the faithful to be pilgrims of hope. "Pilgrimage is a fundamental element of every Jubilee event. Setting out on a journey is traditionally associated with our human quest for meaning in life." (*Spes Non Confundit*, 2024, 5).

This year presents an opportunity for pilgrims who are unable to visit international destinations of pilgrimage to visit the nominate sites within the Diocese.

The nominated sites are:

- ✠ Sacred heart Cathedral, Newcastle West
- ✠ St Mary's Star of the Sea, Newcastle
- ✠ St John the Baptist Shrine, Maitland
- ✠ St Joseph's, East Maitland
- ✠ St Joseph's Murrurundi
- ✠ Blessed Virgin Mary Queen of Peace, Scone
- ✠ Saints Patrick & Brigid, Cooranbong
- ✠ Our Lady of the Rosary Church, Taree

Pilgrimage to Sacred Heart Cathedral



While the Cathedral is open to all every day of the year, we have added a special opportunity for prayer during the Jubilee Year. Join us for Vespers at 5pm on the first Thursday of each month commencing in March and concluding in November: March 6, April 3, May 1, June 5, July 3, August 7, September 4, October 2, November 6

Vespers (also called Evening Prayer) is part of the Liturgy of the Hours, also known as the Divine Office.

The Liturgy of the Hours includes several specified times of prayer. The most important times, called the "hinge hours," are Morning Prayer (which takes place upon rising) and Evening Prayer (which takes place as dusk begins to fall).

Bishops, priests, deacons, and many men and women in consecrated life pray the Liturgy of the Hours each day. Their work is organized around this prayer, keeping God always at the centre of their days. Lay people are encouraged to pray the Liturgy of the Hours as well, especially Morning and Evening Prayer.

Evening Prayer gives thanks for the day just past and makes an evening sacrifice of praise to God. The structure of Evening Prayer is as follows:

Introductory Verse, Hymn, Psalmody - singing or reciting two and a canticle (or hymn)

Scripture Reading, Responsory, Gospel Canticle, Intercessions, Lord's Prayer, Concluding Prayer, Dismissal

We invite you to come along and experience Vespers at the Cathedral, commencing this Thursday @ 5pm.

Join us at St Mary's, Newcastle each Saturday in May (the month of Mary) between 11am and noon to spend a gentle hour in prayer and reflection on Our Lady.

May is considered the "Month of Mary." This time offers a lovely opportunity to explore her role and significance in our Catholic tradition and how her life and virtues continue to inspire followers of her son, Jesus.

Each Saturday morning in May, we will reflect on Mary. Her example of humility, obedience, and unwavering faith makes her a central figure in worship and a guiding light in the lives of many around the world. Join us as part of your personal pilgrimage to spend time with each other and with St Mary at St Mary's in May.

THE JUBILEE LOGO

The logo shows four figures stylised to indicate humanity coming from the four corners of the earth. They are embracing each other to indicate the solidarity and brotherhood which joins the peoples. The figure at the head is holding onto the cross. It is not only the sign of the faith which embraces, but also of the hope which can never be abandoned because we are always in need of hope, especially in moments of great need. It is helpful to observe the rough waves underneath; this indicates that life's pilgrimage does not always move in calm waters. Life's circumstances and the events of the world often demand a greater call to hope and because of this we see that the lower part of the cross has been turned into an anchor which stands out in the wave. As is well known, the anchor has often been used as a metaphor of hope and as a matter of fact, the anchor of hope is the name used in maritime jargon as the name given to the reserve anchor used by vessels involved in emergency manoeuvres to stabilise the boat during storms. Do not ignore the fact that the image demonstrates that the pilgrim's journey is not individual, but communal and marked by a growing vitality leading one always closer to the cross, which is itself by no means static, but also dynamic. It turns towards humanity, not leaving it alone but going out and meeting it to offer it the certainty of its presence and the sureness of hope. Finally, the motto of the 2025 Jubilee Year: *Pelegrinantes in Spem* (Pilgrims in hope), is very visible in green.

THE HOPE THAT DOES NOT FADE

"In our journey towards the Jubilee, let us return to Scripture and realize that it speaks to us in these words: "May we who have taken refuge in him be strongly encouraged to seize the hope set before us. We have this hope, a sure and steadfast anchor of the soul, a hope that enters the inner shrine behind the curtain, where Jesus, a forerunner on our behalf, has entered" (Heb 6:18-20)..."



The image of the anchor is eloquent; it helps us to recognize the stability and security that is ours amid the troubled waters of this life, provided we entrust ourselves to the Lord Jesus. The storms that buffet us will never prevail, for we are firmly anchored in the hope born of grace, which enables us to live in Christ and to overcome sin, fear and death. This hope, which transcends life's fleeting pleasures and the achievement of our immediate goals, makes us rise above our trials and difficulties, and inspires us to keep pressing forward, never losing sight of the grandeur of the heavenly goal to which we have been called.

The coming Jubilee will thus be a Holy Year marked by the hope that does not fade, our hope in God. May it help us to recover the confident trust that we require, in the Church and in society, in our interpersonal relationships, in international relations, and in our task of promoting the dignity of all persons and respect for God's gift of creation. May the witness of believers be for our world a leaven of authentic hope, a harbinger of new heavens and a new earth (cf. 2 Pet 3:13), where men and women will dwell in justice and harmony, in joyful expectation of the fulfilment of the Lord's promises.

Let us even now be drawn to this hope! Through our witness, may hope spread to all those who anxiously seek it. May the way we live our lives say to them in so many words: "Hope in the Lord! Hold firm, take heart and hope in the Lord!" (Ps 27:14). May the power of hope fill our days, as we await with confidence the coming of the Lord Jesus Christ, to whom be praise and glory, now and forever".

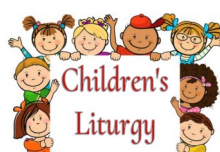

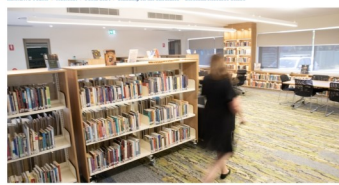

One month into the school year, so it's a great time to have a meaningful conversation with your kids and grandkids about their experiences and feelings. 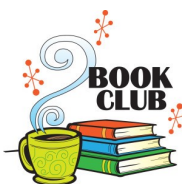

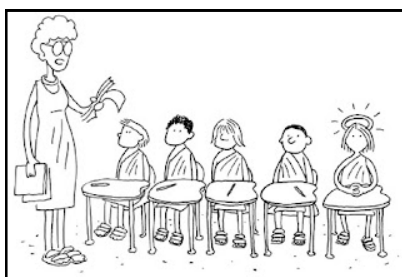

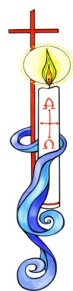
NEW OPPORTUNITIES FOR VOLUNTEERS

We have two exciting new opportunities for volunteers in the region.

REFLECTION BY RICHARD LEONARD

At Rome, during the 16th Century, the most famous confessor in town was St Philip Neri. Popes and paupers sought his counsel and spiritual direction.

One day a famous Duchess came to him and confessed the sin of gossip. Philip Neri told her to go home and get a feather pillow and return to the steps of the Church. Some time later he met her there and produced a small knife. He told the noblewoman to rip open the pillow. As she did, the swirling wind in the square picked up the loose feathers and they danced around the square and down the lanes.

St Philip and the Duchess watched in silence as the feathers went everywhere. He then turned to her and said, "Now, go and collect all the feathers." To which she protested, "They have gone everywhere, I couldn't possibly find and regather them." "So too with your tongue, Madam," St Philip scolded her, "You have no idea where your gossip goes and you can never unsay it."

In today's Gospel Jesus teaches us that our words reflect the state of our hearts.

Psychologists tell us that there are three main reasons why people habitually gossip, or 'share the news' as Australian men prefer to call it: power, envy and boredom.

To know something about someone else can put us in a more powerful position with friends or colleagues. By being able to share what we have 'just heard', we are seen to be current and interesting. But this type of power is destructive because our friends normally assume that when they are absent they are maltreated in the same way. Gossipers have more alliances than friendships.

The most malicious gossip often comes out of envy. Envious gossip often sees people make things up about others and pass it off as though it were true. The worst of tabloid newspapers, television and radio trades on this destructive vice. There is no place for the 'rumour file' in the Christian life. Sometimes, when a company or person have to deny the false accusations made about them, we get what we want – their reputations are tarnished and even their business can be in danger. No wonder medieval theologians called envy a 'deadly sin'.

Boredom, however, is a modern cause for gossip. Our relationships and the way in which we hold each other's trust and good name to be paramount, are undermined by images from the media about how exciting life should be for everyone. Scene after scene in novels, television programs and films where

confidences are betrayed and lives are raked over for comment and intrigue fill in the boredom in our lives with a distorted portrayal of human behaviour. The more we take it in, the more we mirror it in our own conduct.

Jesus does not tell us today that there is no place for criticism, challenge, confrontation and correction in the Christian life. Just that we have the responsibility to very careful about what we say about others and how we criticise and condemn them. Jesus reminds us that most of our condemnation of others, is what we now call, "projection", where we ignore similar failings in ourselves, but roundly condemn them in others.

May this Eucharist, then, help all of us let go of the need to be powerful, the deadly sin of envy and more creative with what we do when we are bored. May it help us make better choices about how we speak, to whom we speak and what we say.

St Philip Neri knew it all too well: most times we cannot know the consequences of what we say and we can never unsay it.

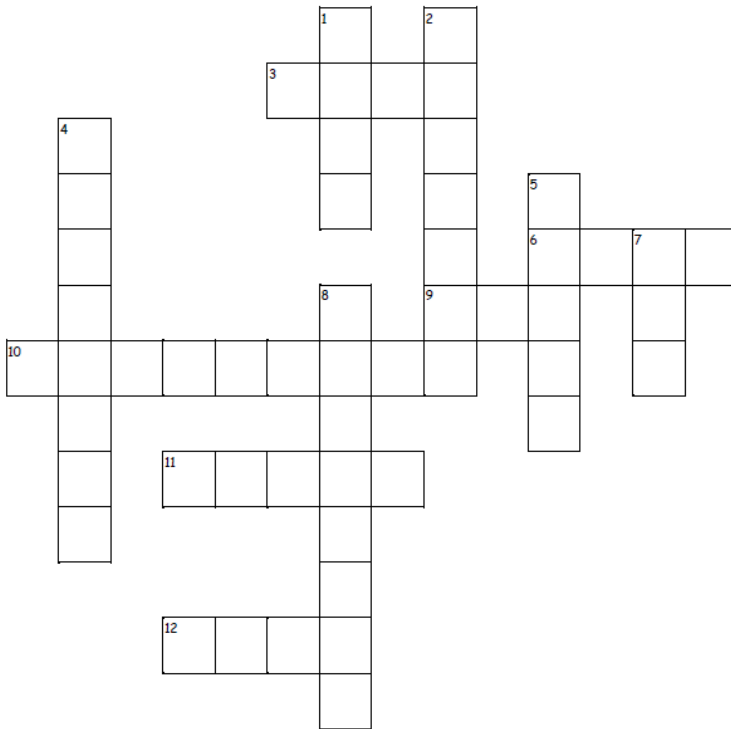

PEACE IN OUR WORLD

"In addition to finding hope in God's grace, we are also called to discover hope in the signs of the times that the Lord gives us. As the Second Vatican Council observed: "In every age, the Church has the responsibility of reading the signs of the times and interpreting them in the light of the Gospel. In this way, in language adapted to every generation, she can respond to people's persistent questions about the meaning of this present life and of the life to come, and how one is related to the other". We need to recognize the immense goodness present in our world, lest we be tempted to think ourselves overwhelmed by evil and violence. The signs of the times, which include the yearning of human hearts in need of God's saving presence, ought to become signs of hope.

The first sign of hope should be the desire for peace in our world, which once more finds itself immersed in the tragedy of war. Heedless of the horrors of the past, humanity is confronting yet another ordeal, as many peoples are prey to brutality and violence. What does the future hold for those peoples, who have already endured so much? How is it possible that their desperate plea for help is not motivating world leaders to resolve the numerous regional conflicts in view of their possible consequences at the global level? Is it too much to dream that arms can fall silent and cease to rain down destruction and death? May the Jubilee remind us that those who are peacemakers will be called "children of God" (Mt 5:9). The need for peace challenges us all, and demands that concrete steps be taken. May diplomacy be tireless in its commitment to seek, with courage and creativity, every opportunity to undertake negotiations aimed at a lasting peace".
