FROM THE PARISH PRIEST



Dear Parish Family,

The 31 October 2025 is recognised nationally as 'Day for Daniel', named in honour of Daniel Morcom who was abducted on his way to buy Christmas presents in 2003. Daniel's parents started 'Day for Daniel' as a way for them to process their grief, but also to ensure that out of their tragedy something good and positive would rise. The 'Day', like our 'Perpetual Day of Remembrance' is designed to highlight the need for not only not forgetting those that have been harmed, abused and/or lost, but also to raise ongoing awareness for vigilance around child and vulnerable person safety.

This Diocese and our church work hard to ensure the safety of all and to keep awareness through ongoing formation and training. I don't think you can be too aware or do too much training. Child and vulnerable person safety is everyone's responsibility, and I know that you take your part seriously. One of the outward signs of 'Day for Daniel' is the wearing of red - a visible sign of commitment. We have our own, including public statements of commitment made by the leadership of the Diocese from the Bishop up. Our other signs, of course, include our training and formation opportunities, discussion at our meetings, and opportunities for 'speaking up' with ears that hear and listen.

You will have noticed the notices we place in our bulletin and on our screens in our churches on a regular basis. The danger with our signs, especially when we don't update them, is they fade into the background of our awareness or consciousness. 'Day for Daniel', as with the Perpetual Day of Remembrance, is an opportunity to have those conversations with our vulnerable people, particularly around what helps keep them safe. We should practise not being 'startled' by the conversations our young people may have with us – we need them to know they can reveal or tell us anything, and we will hear and listen to them. It is practised in the small in the hope we never have to hear the big – our children need to know that we will hear them and respond rather than react.

Children and vulnerable people need options for safety, safe places to land when crisis comes.

This weekend we also remember those who have died. We acknowledge on the 2 November our recently deceased, those who have gone home since our last celebration of All Souls Day. Grief has no time frame in truth and each one of us makes that journey in our own way and our own time. There are cultures, Italian and Filipino for example, which have fixed mourning periods and rituals that allow permission for joy again. We never get over our losses, we only ever get through them. Sometimes the best we can do is to get out of bed. I

know we pray for our loved ones every day. As a Church, a family, we never forget them. I feel sad for those who die alone or without loved ones to remember their names. I hope you will join me in saying a prayer for the repose of their souls even though we may have no name to hold before God.

REFLECTION BY RICHARD LEONARD

All Souls Day has its roots in the sixth century Benedictine tradition of praying to the dead. It was a way of recognising the human bonds which go beyond death. By the tenth century this feast was about praying for the dead, that they might know the merciful love of God.

It is appropriate today for us to think about what a soul is. In an increasingly secular society it's interesting to note that the word 'soul' persists in ordinary conversation. Many non-religious people use this most religious of terms to describe another person. We often hear how others are lonely, distressed, or lost souls. It can be said that someone has a 'beautiful soul' or that a piece of music, a painting or other work of art 'stirred my soul'. We describe mellow jazz as 'soulful' and still alert others to distress by an SOS, 'save our souls'. These uses of the word reinforce St Thomas Aquinas' teaching that the soul makes us human, and sets us apart from other animals.

Nearly all the great religions of the world believe in a soul, or its equivalent – something that survives the annihilation of the body in death. I have come to the opinion that whatever else might characterise the soul, memory is an integral part of it.

So let's remember at this Eucharist all those 'departed souls' we have known and loved over the years, that they might pray for us that we never forget God's saving love and live lives worthy of it.

SAFEGUARDING

Bullying is **repeated, intentional behaviour meant to hurt, intimidate, or control another person**. It often involves an imbalance of power, where the bully uses physical strength, social status, or emotional manipulation to harm someone who is less able to defend themselves. Bullying can take many forms, including physical aggression, verbal insults, spreading rumours, exclusion, or online harassment. Its goal is to cause pain or distress, whether emotional, social, or physical.

However, **not all conflict or teasing is bullying**. Disagreements, isolated arguments and physical contact, or mutual teasing between friends—when both parties find it funny and no harm is intended—do not count as bullying. A single mean comment, while still wrong, is not bullying unless it becomes part of an **ongoing pattern**. Bullying is characterised by **repetition** and a **clear intent to hurt or dominate**.

Labelling every act of unkindness as bullying can minimise real victims' experiences, while failing to recognise genuine bullying allows serious harm to continue. True prevention starts with recognising what bullying truly is—and isn't.

Next week's article will look at how new government anti-bullying regulations extend to Catholic schools.

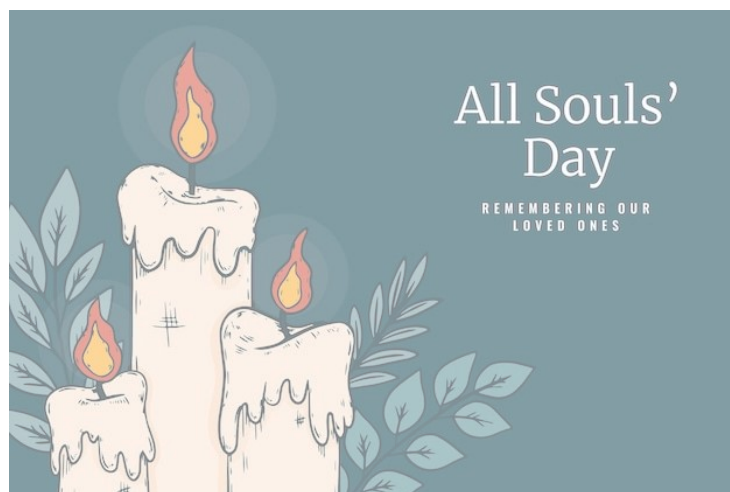

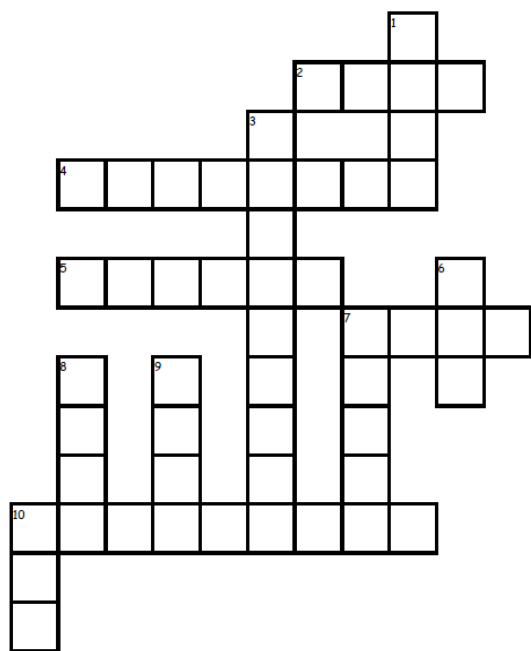
