GOSPEL FOCUS - WHAT'S IN A NAME?

It appears from the passage that Mary's child is to be called both Jesus and Emmanuel. Emmanuel is not intended as a different name for Jesus but rather one of the many titles that will be applied to him. The title means God-is-with-us. That one word, Emmanuel, sums up the essence of Jewish and Christian belief. The Jewish people's faith in God was built on the basis that God travelled with them and through their lives. Christians believe that God took on an even closer sense of being with us through God's incarnation in the life of Jesus.

Our Parishes incorporate suburbs located on the traditional country of the Awabakal and Worimi peoples. We acknowledge their cultural heritage, beliefs and continuing relationship with the land, pay respect to their Elders past and present, and commit ourselves to work together for reconciliation and justice.

FROM THE PARISH PRIEST

Dear Parish Family,



I was a young priest when Port Arthur occurred and remember vividly not only that day but the difficult days that followed. There was finger pointing and

blaming others, none of which was helpful. They were difficult days. I also remember how important coming together as a community was. People spent time in Churches, at spontaneous memorials, in parks and gardens seeking comfort from the shared experience of shock and grief, seeking understanding and support. Thirty-five people, mostly tourists or new to Tasmania lost their lives in what was a moment of senseless violence, an act of evil. The tentacles of evil reached around the world much as it has done this week. People who did not know each other stood in solidarity together, offering comfort in what was the most profound sign of faith being lived in the sacred silence of simply being together. Sometimes there were words, prayers and songs but not often. We came together as signs of hope and with a renewed commitment to 'not let this happen again'.

I've noticed just how much of what happened post 28 April 1996 is being relived post Sunday's tragic and evil act - that senseless act of violence being faced down in renewed acts of coming together for good. The scenes are extraordinary as people gather not only in Bondi and at the flower shrine there, but right around our country. I was moved by the 1000s who paddled or swam out in the ocean off the beach this morning (Friday). Whatever of our Politicians and the continual finger pointing and blaming, the call to light a candle to shine light into the dark places has been an extraordinary sign of hope for our community. Each night and at all the Masses in the Cathedral since Sunday we have lit a candle to shine the light of Christ and to offer prayerful and hopeful support to all who gather. Shining the light of **God's Love** is the only way that evil is overcome and darkness dispelled. It is an action for good and a simple way that we can make our own commitment to do better and be better.

In 1996 this country took huge steps to control access to high powered firearms. We all looked for people to blame and asked important questions for ways forward. Amnesties were offered for the handback of firearms. It gave us hope. It was never going to be perfect however as evil seems to have a way of working around goodness sometimes. We have again an opportunity to reflect on how we can do things better and help in making our community and our people, regardless of faith and background, safer. We are a nation that has worked hard and believes in all

people getting a fair go, that all can and should be allowed to practise their faith, and that we are a place of safety and peace. A good time to reflect on why we live here and what we bring with us to this place and time.

Too often good people stay silent when they should speak, remain spectators when they should be witnesses and actively involved. So many did that on Sunday. The powerful images of people offering everything to save another. As a Catholic Community, we look for ways to transform our world for the better; we don't do that from the sidelines. One of the learnings of my own experience with Port Arthur was we never get over these moments but together we get through our days of sorrow, grief, challenge and difficulty and that we do that together, stepping together into the light.

We stand in solidarity with all those affected as prophets of hope, shining a light into the dark places.

REFLECTION by Richard Leonard

Today's Gospel announces that 'God is with us'. In this final week of Advent the following story reminds us that God comes to us in unpredictable ways often with unsettling messages.

'I hurried into the shop to grab some last minute Christmas gifts. I looked at all the people and grumbled to myself. I would be in here forever. I hurried to the toy department and wondered if the grandkids would even play with my gifts.

'My eye caught a little boy holding a doll. He kept touching her hair and he held her so gently. I watched him turn and ask, "Aunty Jane, are you sure I don't have enough money?" Gently, the woman replied, "Emily doesn't need a doll, David." The woman went to another aisle. The boy continued to hold the doll. David looked so sad that I couldn't resist asking who the doll was for. "My sister wanted it so badly for Christmas." I told him that maybe Santa was going to bring it. He said "No, Santa can't go where my sister is...I have to give the doll to Mummy to take to her." I asked him where his sister was. He looked at me with the tear-filled eyes, "She has gone to be with Jesus. Daddy says that Mummy is going to have to go to be with both of them soon too." My heart nearly stopped beating.

'David went on, "I told Daddy to make sure Mummy goes nowhere until I got back from the store. I want Mum to take this doll to Emily."

'While he wasn't looking I reached into my purse and pulled out some cash. "David how about we count that money again?" He grew excited, "I asked Jesus to give me enough money. I just know I have enough." I slipped my money in with his and we began to count it. He looked up from the count and exclaimed, "Jesus has given me enough money for Emily's doll."

'In a few minutes his aunty came back and I wheeled my cart away. I could not keep from thinking about the little boy as I finished my shopping in a totally different spirit than when I had started.

'On the way home I remembered a story in the newspaper several days earlier about a drunk driver hitting a car and killing a little girl and that the mother was left on life support. Two days before Christmas I read in the paper where the family had turned the machine off. The day before Christmas there was a funeral notice saying that a Requiem Mass would be celebrated on St Stephen's Day for Julia Norris and her daughter Emily. Michael was their husband and father, and their son and brother was David.

'As I gathered with my family in front of an overblown meal which none of us could finish, holding expensive gifts we didn't need and drinking more alcohol than was necessary, I thought "we've lost the plot with Christmas". God-with-us arrives as a simple child in need of love; and in the honour of that day we spend money, eat too much and get drunk.

'I left the table went to my desk and wrote a card for each member of my family. I told them what I'd never been able to say: "I want you to know I love you."

'When they read those cards, my family thought I was losing it, but through David and that doll, God visited me in the last week of Advent and Christmas will never be the same again.'


WHY WE DO WHAT WE DO AT MASS Symbols of the Mass

It's the start of a journey and begins with an invitation, so take a chance! Who will you invite?


