

FROM THE PARISH PRIEST

Dear Parish Family,



In some of the meetings I go to there is a tension of sorts between talking about the church with business or corporate language and maintaining a language that is authentically Christian, and particularly Catholic.

Many faith people, including our priests, struggle with the thought that parts of our church are businesses. They generate government funding, need to be accountable and transparent with how that funding is spent and have a 'product' that is measurable in its outcomes. Our reporting back to the government must be in a language the government understands. We try to do that in a way that remains authentically aligned to the teachings of Christ. Your work in the parishes and in the places you live, work, and socialise helps us when you are authentic in your Christian life.

I'm thinking in terms of the Papal Encyclical of Pope Leo XIII (1891) 'Rerum Novarum', in English 'Of New Things'. It laid the foundations of our modern social justice teachings. It was written as a response to the Industrial Revolution sweeping the world, which saw a huge migration of people from rural districts to live in the cities. It also saw a huge increase in poverty and exploitation of the more vulnerable and often uneducated farmers, fresh from the farms into the city. It called on employers to treat their employees respectfully, paying a just wage for a just day's work. On the flip side it also identified that employees had obligations and responsibilities too—in return for a just wage employees were obliged to give an honest accounting of their labours for the hours they were paid. It was, and is, important. Many of our more modern teachings and encyclicals can trace their foundations to this groundbreaking document.

It can be easy to lose sight, though, of the purpose and meaning of our church in the heart of a 'business' as we are called to run. Our Diocese has 60 schools, 19 childcare centres, supports Foster Care and runs several programs out of CatholicCare that support people with addictions and difficulties. Many of our programs and all our schools, for example, attract funding from the taxpayer dollar. In truth these 'businesses' are held to a high level of accountability as a result, not only by the Government but also because of our Social Justice teaching which takes seriously the 'just wage' theory. We are called to remember at every decision that our primary purpose is spreading the Good News of Jesus Christ. And to do that faithfully by modelling what Jesus witnessed for us as we witness for others.

As active Christians we are looking for ways to do that

witnessing or, more correctly, missioning better. We are missionary disciples, and intentionally missionary disciples. As a parish we have spent a lot of energy and resources on the maintenance of our communities. It is always good for us to support those who are entrusted with the corporate side of the church and our core business so that they don't lose sight of the bigger Christian picture—we are missionary. It is timely, as we prepare for the second phase of our assembly, that we think as intentional disciples, that our strategic planning reflects our missionary work more than our maintenance amidst the bricks and mortar, that seemingly is in endless need of repair or replacement. I hope you will join with me in praying for the success of our Assembly (**second phase 14 February**) and that as we plan together, we will continue to build a community of welcome, encouragement and intentional disciples.

REGIONAL ASSEMBLY (SESSION 1) WHAT WE HEARD ON 1 NOVEMBER

On 1 November over 80 parishioners from across our region gathered for the first session of the Regional Assembly. Together we shared stories, listened deeply, and named what matters most for the future of our parish communities. The energy in the room was one of hope, honesty, and renewed desire to walk forward together. The following outlines the themes that emerged.



1. Community: A Deep Desire to Belong

Across every table, people spoke about the central place of community in parish life.

We heard a longing for:

- Deeper relationships and “knowing one another”
- Better welcome and hospitality
- Rebuilding trust after closures, changes, and grief
- More social connection and opportunities to meet
- Intergenerational friendships

2. Faith and Liturgy: Nourishment for the Journey

People named the need for:

- Strong, life-giving liturgies
- Good music and proclamation
- More silence and reflection
- Better communication around sacraments and liturgical formation
- Clearer teaching and homilies that “speak to the heart”

3. Youth and Families: A Critical Concern

There was real passion for our young people:

- How do we help them belong?
- What do they need from us?
- How do parish and school work together?
- What formation, worship, and community opportunities will speak to them? This included parents wanting support and a desire for children’s liturgy, youth Masses, and intentional engagement.

4. Diversity and Welcome: Becoming a Church for All

The Assembly strongly affirmed the richness of cultural diversity and the need for inclusion, hospitality, and understanding.

Concerns were named around:

- Welcoming new families
- Respect for cultures, backgrounds, and identities
- Being a Church open to LGBTQIA+ people

5. Involvement and Leadership

People want to contribute but need:

- Clear pathways
- Personal invitation
- A culture where involvement is encouraged
- Leadership development and formation

What This Means for Our Regional Assembly

The first session revealed a shared desire to:

- Rebuild community
- Welcome more deeply
- Strengthen faith and liturgy
- Engage youth
- Value cultural diversity
- Develop leadership and involvement
- Renew our mission

These themes will guide the next two sessions:

- **14 February** — Discernment of what we heard at Session 1
- **2 May** — Goal Setting & Pastoral Plan

SCRIPTURE COMMENTARY

Israel is depicted as the servant of the Lord, and it is through this people that God will be glorified. The verb suggests that God boasts through Israel. There is probably a reference to the exile here, and it will be the mission of the servant to bring the people back to the Lord. The spectacular return of the scattered exiles and their re-establishment as a people will be seen as the work of God. The mission that originally focused on the rebirth of one nation is then broken open to include the salvation of all. This is what 'light to the nations' suggests.

The psalm response speaks about thanksgiving for release from some difficulty; dedication to God who is the saviour; and personal witness in the midst of the community. The psalmist does not repudiate the sacrificial system, but insists that God desires an interior commitment that will result in a life of righteousness and faithful worship. The response closes with the psalmist standing before the worshipping assembly and publicly proclaiming the wondrous acts of salvation that God has accomplished. The subject of this public proclamation is the justice or righteousness of God. The psalmist contends that commitment to God and reliance on God's adherence to covenantal promises will assure blessing.

The Letters to the Corinthians are some of the most important Pauline correspondence that we have. Paul begins his self-identification by applying to himself the designation 'apostle'. The word means one who is sent by another, sent with a commission. Paul states that he was called to be an apostle; the initiative was not his. Moreover, he is an apostle of Jesus who is called the Christ (the anointed one). This means that Jesus, the one who died before Paul came to know him, called Paul and sent him out as an apostle. In these three short verses we see the outline of Paul's Christology. He considers Jesus the Christ or anointed one, and he proclaims that Jesus is the source of the sanctification and well being of others.

The gospel reading includes John's report of the baptism of Jesus and his interpretation of that event. He identifies as Jesus the Lamb of God, most likely a reference to the Suffering Servant found in Isaiah 53:7-10. Calling him the Son of God is an allusion to Jesus' divine character. John then contrasts Jesus and himself, as well as the efficacy of their respective baptisms. John baptised with water; Jesus will baptise with the Spirit, a reference to the prophetic promise of future cleansing with water and the gift of God's spirit (cf. Ezek 36:25-26). While John may well have perceived Jesus as the fulfilment of messianic expectations, it is unlikely that he would have expressed this faith in Christian theological terms. The writer of the gospel has given John the faith that we now profess.


